good citizens to protect our children," says event organizer Paul Lachance.





moving into her first house in a few weeks. It's an exciting, super stressful time for her. And for us as well.



# Wells Branch Community Hall: this historic meetinghouse is the perfect gathering place for local events

This is a reprint of a previous story by Dana Pearson

The Civil War-era wood floor received a nice thick coat of paint in June. Though just as covered in gray as the planks, an offset square of tin is clearly discernible in the generous 35-by-45-foot expanse. It's where the woodstove, for most of the building's 155-year history its lone source of heat, once stood. But when the modest kitchen annex was added to the rear in 1970, the woodstove went the way of the butter

There's a furnace providing forced hot air now, and it boasts electric lights, running water, and bathrooms instead of a threeseater out back. Otherwise, the Wells Branch Community Hall is much the same as it ever was – a simple high-ceilinged 19th century New England structure with a clean-lined Shaker vibe. No bells, no whistles. Which makes sense, as it was built as a Unitarian Universalist church in 1864.

It's nothing new when a building's usage changes. Private homes become inns. Old factories become restaurants. Barns become condos. In the case of the meetinghouse on Branch Road in Wells, its usage essentially hasn't changed, even though it's no longer a church; it is place for the community to gather.

With changing demographics throughout the latter part of the 20th century and into the 21st, along with the advent of television, people tend to find terested in icons of the request, which garnered

homes. They go to restaurants or bars or online to socialize.

The Wells Branch Community League has been gathering at the hall for a century. It's been the site of countless bean suppers and dances and variety shows and parties and plays. It reportedly served as a rest station for those battling the '47 Fire. It was the heart of Wells Branch, long an agrarian community once connected to the outside world by railroad. The League began by renting from the Unitarians in 1919. The dwindling congregation sold the hall to the League in 1956.

But because the active membership of the League itself began to dwindle, the hall slowly began to lie fallow. That's what Joseph Foster observed when he moved to Wells from Kennebunk in 2004, shortly before retiring from teaching English at Kennebunk

and soon found himself its Family Foundation. president.

to save the building," said Foster, "which is a hidden jewel. People probably drive by and think, 'What a cute old church."

While the League's membership has shrunk, its core is no less vigilant. When it came time to paint the floor this spring, David and Lucy Hardy, Megan Walsh, Paula Štandley, Dan White, Carol Leblanc, and Foster volunteered for the task, which took the better part of two days to Paint Professionals. Said complete. Joe and Linda Searles have long cared for the hall, with Joe serving as all-around handyman and Linda organizing the perpetual bottle drive, which nets \$2,000 annually, the funds defraying the cost of insurance, maintenance, and electricity.

A significant step in preserving the hall came in 2015 when Foster tried High School. Always in- his hand at his first grant

"I was absolutely 'My main interest was bowled over," said Foster. Within a couple of weeks, Robert Zuke had re-shingled the roof's north side, topped the furnace chimney, and replaced rotting trim boards. Donald Papp of New Hampshire restored the original 12-over-12 windows, even replacing some of the newer panes with antique wavy glass to match the originals. The exterior received a new coat of paint for the first time in 25 years from Seacoast Foster, "It should be good for another 150 years.

It's been good for rent-als, although the League would like to see more activity on that front. With the main room accommodating up to 100 people, and with chairs, parking, kitchen, and bathrooms available, the halal is ideal for wedding receptions, parties, and other gatherings. A small band could perform on the modest stage up front. Though insulated, the hall closes in November and re-opens in late April. Former Wells Branch Fire Chief Rick Clark, a retired York High School teacher whose father and grandfather were League members, oversees rentals.

"I could see young folks being creative with this space for open mics and the sort," said Foster, vho summed up the Wells Branch Community Hall as "a neat old place to enjoy. This was the center of a tightknit community for the better part of the 20th century."

And it still has a role to play in the 21st.







# DISHIN' IT

Delicious, economical, easy leftovers

Noted Hudson Valley chef Donna Hammond suggests several ways to "clean out the refrigerator and still enjoy a very tasty meal." Here's how she dished it up. "I usually have leftovers – homemade stock, pulled pork or taco meat in the freezer. For example, whe I roast a chicken I'll freeze some meat with the defatted

pan juices and gelatin, or when I fry taco meat, I make extra and freeze. They're all you need to concoct a quick soup, salad or quesadilla." "For a satisfying soup in 30 minutes, I'll saute onions, celery and carrots, then

toss in the leftover chicken with vegetables I already have in the refrigerator or on the shelf - like corn or beans."

"For salads, I'll top a mixture of greens with fresh or already cooked veggies, and then add black beans or garbanzos and leftover meat. I serve it hot or cold, depending on the weather – and it's extra tasty when served with good crusty

"To make Quesadillas, I saute tortillas (corn or wheat) and top them with leftover vegetables, cheese and salsa – all items you probably have on hand. They are such a satisfying supper!"

Chef Donna adds, "Sometimes it's just nice to enjoy a simple dinner at home."

# DO YOU KNOW? HOW TO GRILL TOMATOES?

Core 1 pound ripe, firm tomatoes and halve along equator. Toss with 1 tbsp. olive oil, 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp pepper in large bowl. Let stand at least 30 minutes. Place tomatoes (cut side down) on clean oiled grill and cook (covered if using gas) until charred and beginning to soften, 4-6 minutes.

Use tongs or thin metal spatula to carefully flip and cook until skin sides are charred, 4-6 minutes longer.

#### HOUSEHOLD HINT

If you wonder how much propane is left in the tank, try this: pour 1 cup boiling water down the side of the tank, then feel down the metal with your hand. Where the water has warmed the surface of the tank, it is empty; where the tank feels cool, there's still propane inside.



# Elvis wows, but ultimately frustrates

Whatever else Austin Butler does in his acting career, he can always be proud of having pulled off the intimidating feat of ac-curately portraying Elvis Presley. Besides bearing a notable resemblance to Elvis, Butler also nailed his speech pattern, mannerisms, and iconic on-stage moves. And if that weren't enough, he also learned to passably sing like him. The only person Butler lip-syncs to in Baz Luhrmann's Elvis is himself.

There's no new information in the film, especially for Elvis fans. And there are some outright fabrications, but that's fine because, after all, this is a movie, not a documentary. Luhrmann,

omitted that material.


The narrative thread Luhrmann settled on was an interesting one: having the tale told by a dying Col. Parker. But as much as I admire Tom Hanks, I was much more involved in the movie when it focused on Butler's Elvis - that's where the energy and excitement were. (Imagine a movie about the Beatles being told from Brian Epstein's point of view.) If I had my druthers, Parker would've been an omnipresent, overbearing character lurking around in the background, more sensed than seen, coming out into the light only for dramatic effect, like the shark in *Jaws*.


There's so much to praise about Elvis; however, it could've been so much more. In fact, it could've been two movies.

# The Southern Maine Saltwater Fishing Report

by Captain Greg Metcalf

As the summer kicks into high gear, so has saltwater fishing along the southern Maine coastline. Fishing enthusiasts enjoyed a great week of fishing from York to Saco Bay with some outstanding striped bass catches.

It has been an interesting couple of weeks. The few hot weather days beachgoers have enjoyed were accompanied by beach hazard coldwater warnings. The water temperature is still about 5 degrees cooler than last summer at the same time, in the mid-fifties. It is little chilly for swimming but just warm enough for the stripers to start biting.

Kennebunkport: Saltwater anglers fishing the waters between Cape Porpoise and Wells enjoyed a good week of fishing. The water temperatures are still colder than usual but the striped bass fishing perked up considerably.

Mackerel can be found from the Kennebunk #1 bell buoy to the shoreline of Saint Ann's church and along Ocean Avenue. Stripers are being caught all along the beaches, rivers and rocky shoreline between Parsons Beach and the Cape Porpoise islands.

Live mackerel, chunks of mackerel, trolling tube and worm rigs and early morning fly casting have been the most productive methods for catching striped bass. Charters reported fishing has Captain Cal Rob-The fish are getting bigger and the fishing results are becoming more consistent every day.

Wells, Ogunquit: Brandy from Webhannet River Bait & Tackle told me there were some nice stripers caught on fresh and live-lined mackerel this week. Drakes Island Beach was very productive before sunrise all weekend.

The mackerel fishing has improved over the last several days. Surf reports were good from Moody and Ogunquit by fishermen using mackerel and clams for bait. Small, soft plastics are still working well inside the rivers and fly fishing has been exceptional.

York: Captain Phil Breton

been steady in every spot inson of Saco Bay from Wells to York. They are mostly school-sized fish, but Captain Phil is still catching a few keepers from time to time. There ar some jumbosized stripers swimming around near Long Sands Beach in York but they have been hard to hook. Mackerel have been more plentiful this past week with big schools of pogies also moving in.


Goose Rocks Beach: Captain Steve Brettell told me fishing at Goose Rocks Beach improved this week is still relatively slow. Chunk mackerel was the bait of choice. There are not many big fish but there are plenty of sublegal-size stripers.

Saco River and Saco Bay:

Guide Service told me mackerel have been spotty but are nice size. Best stripers are still relating to the Saco River but that should change this week. He is seeing a lot more keepersized fish up to the mid thirty-inch range this year. This is a good a very sign for early in the season. Hopefully the mackerel fishing gets easier this week. The tuna fleet is just starting to go offshore in search of Charlie.
