Turkey on the loose - and thankfully found

My mother's sewing machine hummed all year but it leapt into overdrive in early November. She'd dig into her stash of dog-eared "Family Circle" magazines, locate a "DIY in 10-Minutes Thanksgiving Potholder" pattern, sit down at her Singer and sew serenely all afternoon.

"I thought you might like this for your table, Val," she'd say, presenting me with a ten-foot-long tablecloth ablaze with orange and yellow leaves, hemmed in brown ball fringe. A week later she'd pop by toting a red felt turkey head, stuffed with batting and attached to a metal rod. "Get yourself a ripe pineapple at the A&P," she'd say, "and stick the turkey head on top—it makes an adorable centerpiece."

From aprons trimmed with tangerine rick-rack to dishtowels featuring handstitched pumpkins, Mom's Thanksgiving craftsmanship was bottomless - and endless.

Every year my holi- to spend Thanksgiv- a fire caused when a BBQ on our "traditional" sour day storage box became more crammed. Rick-rack wasn't my thing. I certainly wasn't partial to ball fringe. But I loved Mom and dutifully used every turkey trapping she gave me over the years.

Her one creation that I actually liked was a fourby-six-foot tan banner with an embroidered multi-colored turkey sitting beneath the words: "Come Ye Thankful People, Come."

Over the past two decades, that banner has hung above the fireplace mantle, from a front attic windowsill, but primarily on the entrance porch, a beacon of our hospitality. The banner welcomed siblings from Colorado, New York and New Mexico who frequently flew in for the four-day weekend with their children. It lent credence to our family's open-door policy of inviting "strays" and singles who were alone over the holiday to join us.

Several years ago my husband and I decided ing in Florida where his daughters live. I asked my daughter Alex, who lives in nearby Portsmouth, New Hampshire, if she would like to use any of my decorations. Indeed

she did. "Can I have the turkey banner to hang on our front door?" she asked.

After the holiday Alex put the banner in a box in her basement. Christmas came

and went, winter thawed into spring, summer faded to fall. Suddenly, it was the week before Thanksgiving. I texted Alex and reminded her that I needed the banner since I would be hosting the family that

But there was a problem. The turkey banner was missing. The prior Memorial Day weekend, Alex's house had been completely destroyed by

smoker accidentally exploded. Ten firetrucks with gushing hoses couldn't extinguish the raging blaze that swept through and ravaged her four-bedroom home. No one was hurt,

When brother Robert arrived from Colorado with his family on the Wednesday afternoon before Thanksgiving last year, he looked at the wall of the entrance porch where the banner usually hung. "Where's Mom's banner?" he asked."The fire," I answered. "It was in Alex's basement."

On Thanksgiving morning, we all breakfasted the banner! It smells like

cream coffee cake layered with whole cranberry sauce. We played Rummikub into the night on a table covered with Mom's handmade yellow and orange tablecloth. The weathered red felt turkeyheaded pineapple graced my kitchen island. Only the family banner was missing from traditional Thanksgiving regalia.


Then I began to plan the next Thanksgiving. Because my brother and sister were coming with their families, I wanted to start baking coffee cakes ahead to put in the freezer. I had to figure out where 14 relatives were going to


As I was making a chart of arriving bodies and available beds, my phone rang. Alex said, "Mom, you're not going to believe this. I was down in my basement this morning, sorting through some of the boxes that had been in storage all last year from the fire – and I found smoke, it's a little moldy, but I've got it!"

During the long hard year after Alex's house burned down, we all learned the collateral horror of fire. My daughter's family not only lost their home, they lost library books and lacrosse team shirts, treasured photo albums and piano lesson song sheets, Christmas stockings, ski hats, Easter baskets, bicycles, and a 15-year-old's lifetime accumulation of Legos.

Yes, it was all "stuff." And fortunately, no one was hurt in the fire. But finding that family banner still reeking of smoke underscores why we gather together. When Mom died many years ago, she didn't leave her children money or stock. That frugal woman bequeathed a richer, more meaningful inheritance of hand-sewn tablecloths and turkey heads, all made with love, and with words she wanted her family to live by: "Come Ye Thankful People, Come."

And we do.





Seacoast Garden Club prepares to bloom all winter Area residents invited to open meeting on November 14

Club of Kennebunkport is revving up for the 2022-23 season. Founded nearly 40 years ago by eight local women, there are currently more than 90 members from Kennebunk, Kennebunkport, Arundel, Biddeford and Wells. Meetings are held on the second Monday of each month, from October to May, at the Community House, 8 Temple Street, Kennebunkport, starting with coffee and refreshments at 9:30, then followed by the business meeting and program.

For the November 14 meeting, the club invites area residents who are interested in joining the Seacoast Garden Club to come and meet other members and also enjoy the "Native Seed Talk" program which will be presented by Ginger Laurits of the Wild Seed Projects.

Laurits is a master gardener and volunteer at the Wells Reserve at Laudholm where she coordinates and maintains the native plant garden with other volunteers. She will talk about the Laudholm native plant gardens, why native plants are important to include in our landscapes, plants that work well in Maine perennial gardens and where to buy native plants. Other programs scheduled for 2022-23 include a video/ discussion about Beatrix

Founded early 40 years ago by 19th local women, there e currently more than 19 members from Kenbunk, Kennebunkport, rundel, Biddeford and Farrand, the most successful female landscape architect in early 20th century America; Edible Landscaping by horticulturist Aaron Parker; and Dispelling Common Garden Myths by Jamie Colen, director of Fuller Gardens in North Hampton, N.H.

The SCG builds friend-ships but it is not strictly social. Its members offer volunteer service to the communities where its members live. They also support the Conservation Pledge stated on the inside cover of the SGC yearbook, which reads:, "I pledge to protect and conserve the natural resources of the planet Earth and promise to promote education as we may become caretakers of our air, water, forests, land and wildlife."

Throughout the year, the Seacoast Garden Club maintains a busy agenda. During the summer, members plant and tend local beds at the monument in Kennebunkport's Dock Square, the Community House on Temple Street, the Louis T. Graves Memorial Public Library, the Kennebunkport post office and the Oaks Neck peninsula overlooking the ocean at the intersection of Gooch's and Middle Beaches. They also maintain gardens in Kennebunk, including town hall and the Faerie Garden and "Touch and Sniff" garden at the Kennebunk

Free Library. Additionally, several members plant and maintain window boxes at the Center (formerly known as the Senior Center) in Kennebunk.



The South Church Chime Choir was formed in 2016 with a core group of chimes and players. Since that time, more chimes have been acquired, new players



RECIPES

Sausage Stuffing

"My late mother-in-law, Helen Gillman, made this sausage stuffing for Thanksgiving and was kind enough to share her recipe with me many years ago. It is a family favorite!" ~ Faith Gillman

Ingredients:

- 1 pound sausage
- ½ pound hamburger
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 5 to 6 cloves of garlic, chopped
- 1 quart of chilled chicken stock
- 16 ounces seasoned breadcrumbs
- ½ cup grated parmesan cheese
- 2 slightly beaten eggs
- ½ teaspoon sage

1 tablespoon parsley

In a pan sauté sausage and hamburger, drain and cool. Sauté onion and garlic together, cool.

Combine meat mixture, onions and garlic, stock and breadcrumbs. Add grated cheese, eggs and spices. Mix well. Allow mixture to cool completely before stuffing turkey.

Can also be baked separately in a greased baking pan, covered at 375 degrees for 30 minutes; uncover, bake another 15 minutes at 400 degrees to brown.

Next-Door Neighbor Anne's Sweet Potatoes

Mash 6 cups canned yams (get most of the liquid out)

Beat in: 2 eggs, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1/4 cup melted butter, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. cinnamon and a half-cup of Jack Daniels. Mix with beater until smooth.

Put in buttered casserole; sprinkle with 1/2 cup brown sugar, melted butter, pecan halves.

Bake at 375 (no cover) for 20 minutes.

My Grandmother's Pumpkin Bread

Ingredients:

- 2/3 cup shortening
- 22/3 cup white sugar
- 1 can (1 lb.) pumpkin
- 2/3 cup water 31/3 cup flour
- 2 tsp baking soda
- 11/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp baking powder 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp cloves
- 2/3 cup walnuts
- 2/3 cup raisins

Heat oven to 350. Grease two loaf pans. Cream butter and sugar; add eggs, pumpkin, water. Blend in dry ingredients. Add nuts and raisins.

Bake 65-75 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean.

To me, it looks like low tide at Coney Island after a wicked Nor'easter. And I loathe rice.

Our prize? One frozen 20-pound turkey for the team.

But here's the deal. Betty only cooks popcorn, Donna T. speed-dials carryout most nights, Donna M.'s kitchen on Drake's Island is tinier than a postage stamp. So they looked at me with hope. "Oh sure," I said. "I'll cook us a turkey dinner! No problem.'

We gathered together a few nights ago and ate our prize. We enjoyed all the trimmings - mashed potatoes and gravy, Brussels sprouts with bacon, cornbread stuffing and cranberry sauce, apple pie and a moist, flavorful Tom roasted to perfection.

After they left (toting tupperware containers loaded with leftovers and sliced turkey), Mr. Wonderful and I looked at our kitchen counters piled high with gravy-slathered plates and enough wine glasses to do a Tasting.

Green & Wax Bean Side Dish

Green and wax beans mix with some interesting flavors for a delicious vegetable side dish.

- 2 cups fresh green beans, trimmed
- 2 cups fresh yellow wax beans, trimmed
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup butter
- 3 Tbsp. pine nuts or cashews, toasted 1/2 tsp. dried tarragon leaves
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- dash pepper

Place green and yellow beans in heavy saucepan and add water to cover. Bring to a boil over high heat, reduce heat to medium and cook for 8-10 minutes until beans are tender. Drain well in colander. Add all remaining ingredients to beans and cook over medium heat for 1-2 minutes to melt butter and blend flavors, stirring constantly. Serves 8

I sat on a kitchen stool and Googled "turkey soup" on my iPhone, and found a recipe that suggested I put the picked-apart bird (including the skin and all that unsightly stuff that ends up coating the bottom of the pan) in a crockpot. Really?

"Then," the recipe said, "pour chicken broth to the brim and let it bubble all night long. When we woke the next morning, the entire house smelled like Thanksgiving. Even our cat Sunshine was in a

serotonin sedation state, passed out on the floor just below the simmering crock pot.

After straining and cooling the broth, then skimming off the fat, I poured the liquid into a large soup cauldron, added chopped celery and onions, a few diced carrots, plus a slew of white and dark meat and a handful of half-alive thyme from my withering herb garden out back. When it came to a boil, the soup smelled delicious. And tasted even better when I added two cups of cooked orzo.

I now have enough soup in the freezer to take me through Valentine's Day. I've delivered some to housebound friends getting over Covid. And Mr. Wonderful declared it the best soup he's ever had. I agree!

What happened? Was it the prized turkey? Our fabulous costumes? The nearly-comatose thyme? The simmering crockpot? I haven't a clue.

All I know is that I now adore turkey soup. Well, MY turkey soup anyway.

Pumpkin Cheesecake

Ginger snap Crust

24 ginger snap cookies

3 Tablespoons sugar

1/2 stick unsalted butter, melted

Pumpkin Filling

16 oz. cream cheese, room temperature

1 16-oz can unsweetened solid pack pumpkin

3/4 cup, firmly-packed brown sugar

- 1/2 cup Frangelico (hazelnut liqueur) or a liqueur of your choice
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves

For the crust: Grind ginger snaps and sugar in processor to fine crumbs. With machine running, slowly add butter. Press mixture into bottom of 9-inch spring-form pan. Freeze for 15 minutes.

For filling: Position rack in center of oven and preheat to 350 degrees. Blend all ingredients in processor until smooth, stopping once to scrape down sides of work bowl. Pour filling into crustlined pan. Put a pan under to catch any drips.

Bake until edges of cake begin to pull away from sides of pan and cake begins to brown, about 55 minutes; center will not be

Cool on rack. Refrigerate at least 12 hours. Let stand at room temperature before serving.

Pumpkin Martini

2 tablespoons finely crushed graham crackers, for rimming

1 tablespoon granulated sugar, for rimming

11/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice divided

11/2 ounces vanilla vodka

11/2 ounces Irish cream liqueur, plus more for rimming

11/2 tablespoons pumpkin purée

11/2 ounces Irish cream liqueur, plus more for rimming Cinnamon stick for garnish

Directions

Gather the ingredients.

In a small dish, combine the graham cracker, sugar, and 1 teaspoon of pumpkin spice.

Pour a bit of Irish cream into a second small dish.

Rim a cocktail glass by dipping the rim into the Irish cream, then rolling it in the graham cracker mixture, tapping off excess. Place the glass in the freezer for a quick chill.

In a cocktail shaker, pour the vanilla vodka, 1 1/2 ounces of Irish cream, pumpkin purée and the remaining 1/2 teaspoon of pumpkin spice. Fill the shaker with ice.

Shake vigorously.

Strain into the cocktail glass.


Garnish with a cinnamon stick.

To make a quick pumpkin pie spice: Combine two tablespoons of ground cinnamon, one tablespoon of ground ginger, 11/2 teaspoons of ground nutmeg, and 1/2 teaspoon of ground cloves. This blend also makes an excellent pumpkin spice coffee!

If using pumpkin pie filling instead of puree, use just 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon of pumpkin spice, as the filling has sweetener and spice in it.

Try vanilla or spiced rum as an interesting alternative or for extra spice, replace the vodka with a bold rye whiskey.

Birding Tips

For birds and bird lovers, southern Maine boasts excellent habitats with its indented coastline and numerous islands. These locales are attractive for breeding seabirds, migrating shorebirds and wintering waterfowl. Click into allaboutbirds.org site, which is a great resource for all things birds.

Just getting started? Here are a few pointers:


- 1. Binoculars. Your enjoyment becoming a birder depends on how great the birds look through your binoculars. Recently, binoculars have become available at surprisingly low prices. You can start under \$100 or grab a pair at a local yard sale. Eventually, it may be worth spending between \$250-\$300 for a lighter weight, lifetime warranty, waterproof housing and vastly superior images.
- 2. Field Guide. Once you start seeing birds, you'll start wondering what they are. Pop into your local bookstore and pick up a field guide in your region. Or add a bird identification app to your phone.
- 3. Bird Feeders. With binoculars and a guide in hand, the next step is to bring the birds into your backyard, where you can get a good look at them. Bird feeders come in all types. Start easy with a black-oil sunflower feeder, or in the winter add a suet feeder.
- 4. Spotting scope. Now you have the basic equipment. However, if you really get into it and want to check out those mallards on the other side of the pond or that bald eagle perched on a tree limb a quarter-mile away, you may want to invest in a spotting scope, which is indispensable for getting those detailed clues about a species' ID. Caution: these scopes are not cheap.
- 5. Camera. In this digitized world, everyone is a photographer. Even capturing a blurry photo of a bird can help you ID our feathered friends. According to allaboutbirds.org, more amateur photographers than ever are connecting with birds through taking stunning pictures.
- 6. Skills. Once you're outside and surrounded by birds, the allaboutbirds.org site recommends practicing a four-step approach to identification.
 - a. Judge the bird's size and shape
 - b. Look for its main color pattern
 - c. Take note of its behavior

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- d. Factor in the habitat it's in
- 7. Records. In order to get an accurate picture about where to see a variety of birds, oftentimes birders log and share info including date, time, location, species and weather. Many people keep their records online at the ebird project, which tracks sightings. You can also explore the data all ebirders have entered.
- 8. Apps. When you are out birding, bring along your phone and upload apps like (many of them add in sounds you can listen to as well). My recommendations for apps are: Ibird Pro, Birdseye, Audubon, Peterson or Sibley.
- 9. Connections. While bird watching can be a solo pursuit it can also be a social endeavor, and the best way to learn is from other people. Get yourself out on social media: try Facebook's Maine Birds or the Maine Audubon page.





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


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
