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Turning 100: Minnie Szykniej is still a "hot ticket"

Minnie Szykniej is a busy woman. Whether it's working on crafts, word search puzzles, making Christmas ornaments; sewing curtains or hemming clothes for friends, Minnie - who lives Marie and cat Toby – likes to be active. And at nearly 100 she doesn't plan to stop.





"DID YOU KNOW?"

Learn to make non-dairy cheese

Learn how to make sliceable-shreddable-meltable mozzarella, dill havarti, a cheddar party ball and briny feta (all non-dairy). Flora Brown (vegan, farmer, teacher, mother) taps into her Cornell-honed knowledge of plant-based nutrition and sends you home from Frinklepod Farm with a packet of recipes and the know-how to make your own homemade cheese.

"DISHIN' IT" **Asparagus Gruyere Tart**

Ingredients: Flour 1 sheet frozen puff pastry

2 cups shredded Gruyere cheese

11/2 pounds asparagus

1 tablespoon olive oil

Salt & pepper

Preheat oven to 400. Roll puff pastry into 16x10" rectangle on floured surface. Trim edges and place on baking sheet. Use a fork to pierce dough. Bake 15 minutes or until golden.

Remove pastry shell from oven. Sprinkle with Gruyere. Trim bottoms of asparagus to fit crosswise in the tart and arrange in a single layer over cheese, alternating ends and tips. Brush with oil, season with salt and pepper. Bake 20-25 minutes, until spears are tender.

Don't disparage my asparagus

Only 20 calories in half a cup, asparagus is rich in fiber with "impressive" nutrient profile AND, because it's an excellent source of potassium, helps lower blood pressure.

What's hot in kitchen tools

Have you heard about the FLEXICADO? How about the JARKEY?

Use the FLEXICADO to scoop and slice ripe avocado. It's dishwasher safe with plastic blades and rates raves from Stonewall salesperson: "It's one of our most popular kitchen tools." (\$8.95)

(Then make yummy Avocado Toast: use FLEXI-CADO to slice avocado, arrange on baguette and drizzle with juice of 1/2 lime and 1/2 teaspoon olive oil. Add dash of salt and pepper.)

JARKEY "is one of the handiest tools in my kitchen," a reviewer states. Only 5 1/2 inches long, the plastic JARKEY pops open vacuum sealed jars with no twisting or straining. Even gets kudos from the Arthritis Association! (\$5.95)

HOUSEHOLD HINTS"

Wine corks keep fruit flies at bay!

Fresh fruit is a magnet for fruit flies. But placing wine corks in a bowl filled with bananas, peaches, apples or other fruit sends those annoying flies into the ether. (Can use corks from red or white wine bottles. Flies don't like either!)

Foraging for Spring Ramps

Kathy Gunst, Resident Chef for NPR's "Here And Now" and James Beard Award-winning food journalist, is the author of 13 cookbooks. She also enjoys foraging for ramps

Originally prized by early colonists and available only in the Spring, ramps are a cousin of onions, leeks and garlic.

They taste like spring onions with a garlicky aroma. "Somewhere south of Portland," Gunst wrote, "I was walking and saw a huge patch of gorgeous, oval-shaped green leaves streaked with white and pale pink stripes down the center. They were buried under rocks, some covered in leaves and mulch, and when I pulled them from the ground, I discovered white, scallion-like bulbs covered in thin brown skin."

"Raw ramps have an overwhelming smell, like a cross between wild onions and dirty socks, but cooking transforms them into a true delicacy. I fried the leaves and bulbs in olive oil for five minutes, then fried a few eggs on top. I made ramp pesto, I concocted a French-style tart with ramps and spring mushrooms, and I added ramp puree to sautéed sea scallops. I even made a grilled cheese and ramp sandwich. Ramps dress up even the most basic food."

"DISHIN' IT" Grandma's Rhubarb

With fresh tender Spring rhubarb now available at local markets, here's a tried-and-true recipe that's a cinch to make.

Ingredients:

3 pounds rhubarb, trimmed/cut into 3/4" slices 13/4 cup sugar

Preheat oven to 350. Place rhubarb in 13x9" baking dish, add sugar and toss well. Cover tightly with heavy-duty aluminum foil and bake 25 minutes. Uncover. Stir. Then, replace foil and continue cooking 20 minutes or until tender. Keeps 10 days in refrigerator.

You've got your standard, you've got your butterfly and jumbo butterfly, you've got your batwing (a.k.a. slim), as well as diamond point, slim diamond, rounded club, and ribbon (a.k.a. Western). Who knew there were so many? Probably people who regularly wear bow ties. I am no such

Why did I feel inclined to learn about the bow tie recently? Well, without getting maudlin about it, my father died in mid-February, and my mother, ever practical and desirous of getting rid of stuff that she feels takes up valuable space in the house, leapt into action and, amidst all the activities you'd imagine taking place during such a time, bequeathed to me my father's collection of ties and bow ties (among other items of clothing and accessories). Even before my father's passing, my mother would bequeath various items to me – sometimes bequeathing bona fide heirlooms, sometimes bequeathing extra dishes or glasses, but always bequeathing stuff she wanted out of the house. There was a serious amount of bequeathing going on for years, with the transference of ties being the most recent example.

Taking the time to try to tie one on

though there were several I couldn't pos-

sibly wear, due to their composition of wool, to which I am highly allergic. A shame, since Dad had some really nice wool sweaters and jackets. At any rate, I took the ties home and added them to my collection, which had received a significant boost when I was in high school, around 1979, when Dad, recognizing the resurgence in popularity of skinny ties (e.g. the Knack, the Cars, Blondie, Billy Joel, Bryan Ferry), bestowed upon me (he was more into bestowing than bequeathing) 14 of the coolest skinny ties I've ever seen. He had worn them in the early '60s, when Kennedy and the Beatles and Dick Van Dyke were rocking the look. I suppose I should be grateful for the eventual widening of the tie, which forced Dad to retire and thereby preserve his vintage stock.

All of his ties are timeless, except one, which I shudder to envision. It was as wide as a lobster bib, possessed a color scheme painful to the eyes, and was so hideous in design that Paulie Walnuts would've tossed it out as

What intrigued me most about the collection were the bow ties. The only ones I previously owned were two pre-tied models, for which no manual dexterity is required. So here I now have ten bow ties at least as old as I am, mostly silk, mostly batwings (the flat-ended variety), with two beautiful diamond-pointed specimens from the 1950s that my dad picked up at Cardinal Neckwear on 5th Avenue ("The Center of the World"), most likely while visiting his Uncle Ned and Aunt Ruth, who lived in Manhattan. I would wear them proudly in honor of my father (and look good while doing so). In fact, one of the first thoughts I had while bringing the bow ties home was that I'd wear one of them at his memorial service in early April.

I laid out my blue paisley jacket and blue shirt, then draped one of the batwing bow ties over the shirt's collar – you know, a preview. Let me just cut to the chase here and say it didn't happen. With the memorial service fast approaching, I viewed several YouTube videos on how to tie a bow tie, even one by Bill Nye the Science Guy, but all I learned were new curses. I also learned that one of my father's regular ties - a blue polyester number with green pine trees made by Especially Maine in Arundel (had to be from the 1970s) – looked really good with my intended suit.

I will learn how to tie a bow tie. I just need a little more time, and perhaps direct instruction from an actual human being, which I'd be less likely to swear at. 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





Four years ago when we bought our current house, the market worried me so much that it kept me up at night.

Rhubarb Berry Crumble

This easy dessert, breakfast, or mid-day snack celebrates the early rhubarb harvest and makes use of any berries you might have hanging out in the freezer. Use gluten-free oats to make it gluten-free. Serves: 4 to 6.

1 pound rhubarb (about 4 large or 8 small stalks) 8 ounces frozen strawberries, raspberries, and/or

blueberries, thawed and the juices saved

1/4 cup maple syrup (or more to taste)

1 tsp orange zest

2 Tbs tapioca starch (or cornstarch or arrowroot powder)

Preheat the oven to 350°F.

Wash and trim the rhubarb, then cut it into slices that are between 1/4" and 1/2".

Place the sliced rhubarb in a 9" deep dish pie pan.

Combine the tapioca starch with some of the thawed berry juices until the tapioca is completely dissolved and there aren't any lumps. Mix in the maple syrup and orange zest, then pour the berry mixture over the sliced rhubarb.

To make the topping, process 3/4 cup oats in a food processor to make a coarse flour. Add the cinnamon and sea salt, then the syrup and coconut oil, and pulse to combine until it forms clumps. At the end, add the remaining 1/2 cup oats and walnuts, and pulse just to combine, or mix in by hand - you want the oats to remain mostly whole. Sprinkle the topping over the fruit mixture in the pie plate.

Bake for 45 minutes or until the topping is golden brown and the filling is bubbling.

Enjoy warm or cold!

I love the movies. There are a handful of movies that I will watch again when they pop onto the TV, whether it's the first five minutes or the final ten. Those flicks are just that good. At the top of my list is The Shawshank Redemption, the 1994 sleeper classic. This 1920s prison-life tale was based on a novella (Rita Hayworth and Shawshank Redemption) by Stephen King. It has become a cable staple, only to rise to be the most popular most every King story takes on IMDB's audience system and the most-rented movie of 1995.

Here is some trivia about one of the greatest movies ever made.


- •The casting of Morgan Freeman went against what was written by King. Freeman plays Red, a fellow convict who befriends Andy and gives him guidance. In the novella, Red is a white Irishman. Obviously, Freeman is neither of those things. A bit of wit was rolled into the film where protagonist Andy Dufresne (played by Tim Robbins) asks Red why he's called Red, to which he retorts, "Maybe it's because I'm
- •A young upstart actor Brad Pitt was cast in the role of the young convict Tommy. Then, Thelma and Louise came out. Just like

that - "poof" - Pitt was a note and some cold hard thrust into the spotlight, and he decided to drop out of Shawshank to pursue other opportunities. Gil Bellows, who was making his film debut, took the role instead.

- According to maxim. com, Tom Hanks declined to take on the role of Andy because he was already committed to Forrest Gump. Tom Cruise also attended table reads for the role but turned it down.
- •As one might suspect, place in Maine. According to yardbarker,com: "They did not actually go to Maine for shooting the film. The bulk of the movie was shot in Mansfield, Ohio, using the Ohio State Reformatory in the city for the prison in the film. Also, they didn't go to Zihuatanejo, Mexico, either. Those scenes were shot in St. Croix."
- The Academy loved the film more than initial audiences did. The Shawshank Redemption received seven Oscar nominations, including one for Best Picture. It did not win a single one of those awards. Schindler's List won the Best Picture in 1994.

cash under a white oak tree for Red that directs Red to their reunion in Mexico. Over the years, it became known as "the Shawshank Tree" and became a bit of a tourist attraction The 100 ft. oak was located in Monroe Township, Ohio. In 2011, the tree was struck by lightning. By 2016, strong winds finished the job of taking down the tree. In 2017, they cut the tree down and used it to make Shawshank memorabilia.

- Before this film, Freeman had never narrated anything. These days, we're used to Freeman's smooth, sonorous voice narrating a movie or TV show. Some of his better-known works include documentaries like *March of the Penguins,* the Steven Spielberg's adaptation of the classic H.G. Wells novel *The War of the* Worlds and Disney World's "Hall of Presidents" narration.
- "You can catch a glimpse of Freeman's son Alfonso in the movie. When you see mug shots of a young Red, it's Alfonso standing in for his father. You can see the family resemblance," according to vardbarker.com
- •Director Scott Darabont loved the story and paid King for the rights to Rita Hayworth and Shaw-





Q: We are in our mid-seventies and are looking at what is a wild and crazy real estate market. I am confused. If our lender accepted and moved forward on ur loan with the Mortgage Survey, why can't we use that same survey for the project. Seems weird and just an added expense. Calvin

A: Your confusion is pretty common. Most folks think that when they have a Mortgage Survey done that it gives them the total and complete picture of their property, That is not the reality. Your Mortgage Survey is an investment tool by the lender. It does not show the years of permitting that impact the property. It does not confirm the boundaries, right of ways, etc. that have been done over time. There are no guarantees with a Mortgage Survey. It is an overview. A Boundary Survey is what tells you the accurate story of the property which is what your contractors are speaking about.

Points of Interest

Beach Plum Farm, Rte. 1, Ogunquit. Preserved farmhouse and barn on 22-acre saltwater farm, near the Ogunquit River. Includes the Roby Littlefield Museum. Beach Plum Farm also serves as headquarters of the Great Works Regional Land Trust. Open dawn to dusk, year-round; free admission. No dogs. FMI gwrlt.org 646-3604.

Cliff Walk, York Harbor. One-mile walk starts at the public parking lot (parking permit required) beside the Stage Neck Inn, off Route 1A. Free parking available on Rte 1A. The walk winds along the edge of rock cliffs, and offers dramatic views of the crashing surf, and views of some of York's most beautiful estates. The trail is narrow and rocky, and without a guardrail in places. Rubber-soled shoes are advised.

Fisherman's Walk and Wiggly Bridge, York. The walk is three-quarters of a mile, and starts at the George Marshall Store on Lindsay Road, near Hancock Wharf. It leads through Steedman Woods Preserve to the Wiggly Bridge, a 75-foot-long mini-suspension pedestrian bridge, then crosses Route 103 to the Sayward-Wheeler House, and ends at Edward's Harborside Inn on Stage Neck Road.

Marginal Way, Ogunquit, is a one-mile paved walkway that follows the shore from Perkins Cove to Shore Road. A favorite spot for artists and photographers, because of its scenic overlook of surf and rocky outcroppings. Paid parking is available at Perkins Cove, and also at Obed's Lot, Cottage St., at the north end of the walk. Masks required due to narrow path. Benches and handrails not sanitized. Map at marginalwayfund.org.

Mount Agamenticus in York, elev. 692, (also known as "The Big A") is the tallest hill on the Atlantic seaboard between Florida and Mount Desert in Acadia National Park. On a clear day, panoramic views extend along the Maine coast, west to Mount Washington in New Hampshire and south to Boston. A variety of trails available for hikers and mountain bikers. The summit is a popular site in the fall for watching migrating hawks, including peregrine falcons, bald eagles and osprey. Access from Mountain Road, off Route 1. Parking currently limited. READ Covid-19 update and rules before you go. FMI agamenticus.org.

Walker's Point, the family compound of former President George Herbert Walker Bush, can be viewed from Ocean Avenue, Kennebunkport. There is limited parking along the road; best viewing and easiest access is by foot or bicycle. Follow Ocean Avenue, two miles from Dock Square.

Blowing Cave - and while you're there, check out the blowing cave, just a few feet from the parking area. The hollow, about eight feet from top to bottom, extends nearly 16 feet into the rock. It fills with the incoming tide, and when a big wave rushes in, the overflow gushes into the air with an explosive roar. An impressive sight at mid to high tide and awesome during a storm.

The Wedding Cake House, 105 Summer Street, Kennebunk, is one of the most photographed structures in the area. On the National Register of Historic Places, this distinctive Federal-style brick house was built in 1825 by shipbuilder George Bourne. Bourne added the lavish, ornamental "frosting" about 25 years later. It is a private home so viewing is from the roadside only.
