Here's to playfulness – both in spirit and in action!



"FOREVER": The United States Postal Service and I disagree about the meaning

Houston singing: "And I, ah I, will always love you, ew ew ew, will ALWAYS love you, ew ew ew...." (Sure you do!)

Well, "always love you" certainly sounds like Whitney was going to love the guy forever. But, in truth, she boarded the plane, strapped on her seatbelt and flew away, leaving Kevin Costner standing there on the runway all forlorn.

And look at wedding vows: "Will you love and cherish this wonderful woman as your wife until death doth do you part..." (Or some such.) To me, saying "I will" and "I do" at a whopping \$160 billion." the altar should mean that marriage will last forever, right? My first marriage sure didn't and I guess we'll just have to ignore the national divorce rate that's more than 50%.

So ... how about these FOREVER stamps that the Unite States Postal Service has been touting and selling since April 2007. To me, a Forever stamp would mean paying the exact same price today that I paid for the first Forever stamps 15 years ago, which was 41 cents. That is forever. But, like Whitney's song and vows at the altar, that is not the case.

Pal Sandy Boardman, Remember Whitney who doubles as an investigative stringer for "Wandering With Val," called the other day. She was steaming. She said, "I was just at the post office and the guy told me the price of Forever stamps is going up to 60 cents on July 10. How can they call it a Forever stamp if the price keeps rising? Forever doesn't rise. Forever stays the same. Doesn't it?"

Everyone knows the United States Postal Service loses gazillions of dollars every year. I mean, they're like a sieve with money. Current statistics indicate "the Postal Service is in debt Hasn't the hefty and steady increase in the price of Forever stamps done anything other than get Sandy's and my lace panties in a knot?

What about the poor beleaguered soul who stuffs my PO Box 2800 in Kennebunkport with Talbots and Lands End catalogs, LL-Bean promotionals, hearing aid and Life Line Screening ads, weekly shoppers and AAA solicitations. (I haven't had a letter in years) Have the employees enjoyed any largesse from the constantly tick-tick-ticking upward of stamp prices? Not from the look I've seen in their eyes...

Interestingly, there have been only two times that the postage rate has fallen in the past 100+ years. In 1919 the cost of mailing an envelope dropped from three cents to two cents. Another price drop occurred in April 2016 when the USPS lowered their first class postal rate from 49 cents to 47 cents price FOREVER.





Kennebunkport: Fishing along the shoreline between Cape Porpoise to Parsons Beach has picked up considerably after a tough week of wind of rough sea conditions. The water temperature was a frigid 50 degrees early in the month, but it has warmed up into the mid-fifties and that really helped the

Wells, Ogunquit: Brandy from Webhannet Tackle told me the stripers have been steady this week. The early morning before and around sunrise have been the most active. Fish are being caught from Drakes Island Beach, Ogunquit Beach and River. Live or chunk mackerel and sea worms are the predominant baits right now. Stripers ranged from 20 to 42- inches this week with many keepers caught from boats and also from shore. Several mornings this week at the bottom sons. York: Captain Phil Breton Charters reported fishing has been very good. Nubble Light has been productive while Short Sands Beach has been hit or miss. Moody Beach has been the most productive area particularly at high tide also. Mackerel fishing started off slow early in the month but has greatly improved especially early in the morning.

Goose Rocks Beach: Captain Steve Brettell reported fishing at Goose Rocks was slow this week. Cold water has slowed everything down. Cape Porpoise has been slightly better especially inside the harbor.

Saco River and Saco Bay: Captain Cal Robinson of Saco Bay Guide Service told me that mackerel showed up in fishable numbers on Sunday along with the biggest bloom of small bait that he has seen in a long time. 

Donna Hammond graduated from the Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, New York. When applying for a position in the upstairs cafe of the renowned Chez Panisse in Berkeley, California, Donna had to create and cook an entire meal for chef/owner Alice Waters (soup to entree to nuts, including wine) ("Intimidating!" she admits, but she nailed the job.). She currently "chefs" throughout the Hudson Valley in New York state.

"The two spices I always use are sea salt and good, freshly ground black pepper — I'm especially partial to Lampong."

"The pots and pans I MUST HAVE are: an 8" nonstick egg pan, a 12" saute pan, a 1 1/2 gallons stock pot, a 1/2 sheet pan, and a Dutch oven."

"Most dishes are improved with an addition of acid — a pickle, sauerkraut (I make my own), chili flakes or a squeeze of lemon."

"Extra virgin olive oil or fresh lemon juice is a good substitute for butter."







Field Notes of a Maine Birdwatcher A bird's house is his castle

by Ken Janes

I am paraphrasing the old quote of course but the House Wren takes this idea to a new level. The males are difficult to see when they first arrive in the spring but they announce their territory with a loud bubbling song that seems to go on all day long. These five-inch plain brown birds love backyards and will nest in any bird house, flower pot, drain pipe or even last year's Christmas wreath. In fact, a male may start up to twelve nests, and then he lets the female pick the one she likes. After making a choice, she will lay 5 to 6 eggs that hatch in about two weeks. Wrens are small but defend their neighborhood vigorously and will drive away any birds competing for nesting sites. They have been known to puncture the eggs of any birds nesting nearby. We are lucky to have a pair at our house and we have been watching nest building activity for the last two weeks. This ambitious male found himself with a stick way too big to get into the nest. He solved the problem by fixing the stick on the outside of the nest box, getting inside and then pulling the stick through the hole. I hope his lady friend appreciated all the work that went into building his castle.

together, and were seated at napkin and folded one end sauce to escape the bowl-not kin's on my lap and...and... it's just too painful to relive.


