on 57 acres with a figureeight zoo layout. Although I am a native Mainer, I had never visited the park and always thought it might be just a children's petting zoo. Oh contrarie!

On the long tree-laden drive into the Kingdom, there are numerous trivia signs about the animals like: What's in a camel's hump? Fat or Water? And then a quaint covered bridge. Quite simply, the animal kingdom is a step back in time

safely contained within a tree forest. Turning to the left, there are camel rides (I was tempted) and little pony rides. Please note that the camels and ponies are the only animals that do not reside at the site yearround (they are transported to Florida in the off season - like some of our readers - ha!).

Then the park opens up to a large and tranquil lake full of ducks. Along the way, we took in the leaping lemurs, jumping red-tailed monkeys, two colorfully loud macaws, and a large pen of young goats for petting.

Then we entered the parakeet encounter – a spacious feeding experience, where the 300+ pastel-colored tiny budgerigars would fly around in a friendly fashion. Visitors could hold food sticks to get a close encounter with the birds. It was my Snow White moment.

As we turned the corner, zoo adventure, a baby hip-

> earlier, "Sunday," a baby zebra, was prancing around as her parents grazed on hay. Amazing!

It was cool to see the sloth hanging out in these lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer; a (another feeding experience); a few kangaroos and several wallabies (even one with baby Joey popping out of her belly) and ever-playful river otters in a natural-looking habitat (FYI – it is a heated, jacuzzi-like pool). A prehistoric-looking southern cassawary made me think of Jurassic Park, as they have been labeled 'the world's most dangerous bird." The prairie dogs were quite animated in their Alamo-like structure.

Then you come upon the lioness and lion resting in the large field. Incredible as an adjective doesn't quite fit the experience. Their presence was calmly dominant.

Not to miss is the lush 5,500 sq.ft. Butterfly Kingdom featuring South and Central American butterflies. While I visited during their down time, usually many butterflies fly around and land on you for a rest. Within the trees of the airy enclosure, we witnessed the beautiful and sometimes iridescent wings of these graceful insects.

Note: none of the animals are native to Maine. Yet, the team of professionals pen of fallow deer have taken great care to recreate original habitats for the animals, who seem to love being visited. In each enclosure, the animals had a space to roam and control over how they explore their enclosure. It seemed evident that they could experience natural substrates,








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# Witbeck and Williams, together again

That is exactly what Shows on Maine Art Hill is celebrating from August 27 to September 15 with artists Bethany Harper Williams and David Witbeck. Starting at 10 AM, Saturday, August 27, this dynamic duo fills the walls at 10 Chase Hill Road in Kennebunk.

"We have showcased this talented pair a few times with great success," said gallery owner John Spain. Both Witbeck and Williams revel in Maine's summer, so saying goodbye to the season with these two artists seems perfect.'

From his first venture on a fishing boat, working behind his camera instead of in front of his canvas, artist David Witbeck fell in love with these hard-working folk. He captures their essence of work and play, along with so much more of Maine.

"I never know where my piece of real life, a memory, a color, a moment," said Witbeck. "My fishermen often remind me in a distant way of Andrew Wyeth. He celebrated the fishermen and their dories but in a way very different from my own. Still, we certainly share the same sense of respect for this demanding career.'

Artist Bethany Harper Williams finds inspiration in daily life. She uses small shapes to create her scenes of summer. Each small brush stroke is coupled with a collection of marks. The expanse of the canvas allows Williams to play with texture, shape, and color, abstracting the elements but using figures or boats to put everything into context. However, adding geometric patterns in her oil paint often spark questions.

"I prefer to go beyond what is expected. I keep the

viewer intrigued, finding more, and wondering. I play with patterns. Polka dots, lines, circles," said Williams. "It is meant to be playful and whimsical, not focussed on representing the reality, but creating a joyful mood. This keeps the viewer continu-ally involved, looking, and questioning.'

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## LOBSTER LORE

Reportedly, in 1621, Miles Standish breakfasted on lobster at the first Sunday Brunch in the Bay Colony, and pronounced it "quite edible." His fellow settlers along the Atlantic coast, however, weren't as enthralled with the creepy-looking crustacean. When lobsters piled up on their shores after a howling Nor'easter, they promptly dumped the critters in their newly spaded gardens as fertilizer. The extras were doled out to widows and orphans, brought home to feed the servants, or delivered to the local gaol for prisoner repasts.

The 19th century marked a turning point in public appreciation of Maine lobster. Heretofore used primarily as bait to lure the more popular codfish, lobster suddenly became recognized as a dish fit for a queen... and an emperor. Napoleon is reputed to have savored a smashing victory by celebrating with Lobster Thermidor. Queen Victoria was so partial to lobster smothered in hollandaise sauce, she put it on the palace party menu.

Lobster Tales: Recipes and Recitations Featuring the Maine Attraction was published by Brooks MacDonald and Martha Griffin 25+ years ago. It's still a highly popular and useful cookbook, showcasing favorite lobster recipes served at Hurricane Restaurant and The Kennebunkport Inn when Brooks and Martha were "on the range."

#### **Lobster Quiche** with Mascarpone Cheese

(From Lobster Tales) Serves 8

Ingredients: One 11" pie crust

2 1/2 cups heavy cream

4 large eggs

1 cup mascarpone cheese

1/4 tsp. salt

4 twists of pepper mill

1 tbsp. dry sherry

8 oz. fresh picked lobster meat

2 tsp. garlic chives, snipped

#### Directions:

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

- Whisk cream, eggs, cheese, salt, pepper and sherry.
- Spread lobster meat evenly over bottom of pie shell and sprinkle with chives.
- Slowly pour cream mixture into pie shell.
- Bake 15 minutes at 400, then lower heat to 325; continue baking for 35 minutes or until knife inserted comes out clean.
- Let sit 20 minutes before serving.

Ingredients:

11/4 to 11/2 cup lobster meat

4 tbsp. butter

4 tbsp. flour

3/4 tsp. dry mustard

6 slices of bread, no crusts, cut into bite-size

1 pint Half & Half Douse of good sherry Salt & pepper

2 cups Ritz crackers

#### Directions:

- White sauce: melt butter, add flour, cook 2 minutes; add mustard, sherry and warmed Half & Half; stir until blended and smooth.
- Toss lobster with white sauce and bread cubes, then put in a buttered casserole dish.
- Top with crumbled Ritz crackers. Let "ripen" overnight in refrigerator.
- When ready to cook, bake 30-40 minutes

# UGLY ANNE'S LOBSTER STEW

(From Lobster Tales and originally created by Captain Ken Young of Perkins Cove whose boat was named the *Ugly Anne*.)

Serves 6

Ingredients:

1 1/2 lbs. picked lobster

1/2 lb. butter

1 tbsp. dry sherry

1 tsp. fresh chives 1/2 tsp. minced garlic

9 cups milk

3 cups evaporated milk

#### Directions:

- Melt butter in skillet. Add sherry, chives, garlic
- Mix evaporated milk and regular milk in separate pan. Scald.
- Pour milk mixture into lobster pan and heat through. DO NOT BOIL!

#### **Loaded Lobster Rolls**

(courtesy of Kathy Gunst, noted Maine chef, two-time James Beard nominee, author of *Notes From a Maine Kitchen*) Serves 2

Ingredients:

1 cup picked lobster

1 1/2 to 2 tbsp. mayonnaise

(NOTE: since 1924, Cains has been the brand of choice for many Mainers)

11/2 tsp. fresh lemon juice

1/2 tsp. lemon zest

1 tbsp. minced fresh chives

1 tbsp. finely chopped scallion

Salt & pepper

1 tbsp. unsalted butter

2 (3") pieces of baguette or crusty bread, or 2 hotdog rolls

- Mix mayo, lemon juice, zest, chives, scallion, then a touch of salt and pepper to taste.
- Fold in lobster meat. Refrigerate 3-4
- When ready to serve, melt butter over low heat, cut baguette pieces in half lengthwise and brown the inside of bread in butter. (Alternatively, melt butter and saute hotdog rolls until golden brown).
- Divide lobster mixture between bread or rolls.

You can add: 1 tbsp. drained capers, 2 tbsp. finely chopped celery, lime juice and zest instead of lemon, tender lettuce leaves, slices of ripe tomato, 2 strips cooked bacon, thinly sliced avocado or red onion.

Linda Greenlaw's lobster rolls (Recipes From a Very Small Island) feature one cup picked lobster meat tossed with 1/4 cup vinaigrette dressing, 1/2 cup diced celery, 1/2 cup mayo, then served on grilled hotdog roll.

Equally tasty are the "Connecticut-Style" lobster rolls in Sarah Lee Chase's New England Cookbook: melt 10 tbsp. Kate's salted butter in skillet, add 1 pound picked lobster, cook 4-5 minutes; add pinch of sweet paprika, then dollop into 4 top-split hotdog buns (grilled also in butter, if preferred); serve with 4 lemon wedges for spritzing.

My recipe for 4 lobster rolls is deliciously simple and easy: mix 11/2 cup picked lobster meat with a dollop or two of Stonewall Kitchen's Farmhouse Mayo; sprinkle with salt & pepper; then stuff the mixture into browned-in-butter Brioche rolls.

## LOBSTER RISOTTO

Serves 8



#### Ingredients: 1/2 cup diced shallots 2 cloves garlic, diced

1 tbsp. olive oil 2 cups Arborio rice (Italian short grain rice)

1 cup dry white wine 5 cups chicken broth, heated

1 cup lobster stock or bottled clam juice, heated 1 lb. fresh picked lobster meat, coarsely chopped

1 can (6 to 8) artichoke hearts, sliced 1 cup minced sun-dried tomatoes 1/4 cup fresh parsley chopped

#### Directions:

In large pot saute shallots and garlic in olive oil until soft.

Over medium heat, add rice and stir to coat with oil. Add wine and stir until absorbed.

Combine chicken broth and lobster stock and add the warm broth 1 cup at a time until rice is tender. (About 30 minutes)

Just before rice is done, add lobster meat, artichoke hearts, sun-dried tomatoes and parsley. Mix well, serve immediately.










# Brick Store Museum Spofford Advancement Fund fuels museum's vision

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




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#### Maine News Briefs

- Mark your calendars: Maine Authors Publishing will be hosting their third annual book festival on Aug. 27, from 11 AM 4 PM, at 12 High St., in Thomaston. Forty-nine authors will be in attendance to sign and sell their books. The event will also include a children's area hosted by the Coastal Children's Museum, presentations, raffles, live music by Castlebay, sandwiches for sale from the Jersey Plate food truck and ice cream from Stone Fox Farm Creamery.
- Check your receipts: Just two years after it was implemented, a fee tacked onto pesticides (ranging from weed killer to disinfectants and sanitizers) purchased in Maine has been repealed. Maine implemented a \$0.15 pesticide fee in 2020. It was placed on more than 10,000 everyday items, but this past session, lawmakers in Augusta decided to take it away. The repealing of the law by the legislature means stores can no longer charge the \$0.15 fee.
- Maine has just adopted a 998 hotline for people experiencing a mental health crisis, as a new way to reach out for help. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8. Modeled after 911, the new three-digit 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal, or in any other mental health crisis, to a trained mental health professional.





# The Southern Maine Saltwater Fishing Report

spotty this past week with great fishing on one day and mediocre fishing the next. Bluefish have made an appearance, nothing spectacular, but there were few landed. Striped bass still remains the primary target for fishermen. The offshore action for tuna, sharks, pollock and haddock was very good all week long.

Kennebunkport: The striper fishing from Cape Porpoise to Parson's Beach has been consistent. Anglers aboard the Striper Swiper have not been catching big numbers of fish, but the ones they catch were slightly larger this week. We caught two stripers over thirty-five inches during the week and several in the low to mid-thirty-inch range. Large schools of mackerel are still in the area but move around and take some time to locate on some days. The beaches and the Kennebunk River have both been very productive. The Kennebunk River is loaded with smaller school-sized stripers.

Wells, Ogunquit: Brandy from Webhannet River Bait and Tackle told me stripers were caught early mornings and evenings this week. The water temperature is now in the mid-sixties and most fish were marked near the bottom. The most

success was with tubes Inshore fishing was a bit and worms in between the jetties. Some larger stripers were taken on mackerel around Bibb Rock and near the Cliff house off of Ogunquit. Mackerel were harder to locate this week, but are still in the area and easy to catch once you find them. You will have better results if you fish for them early in the morning. Ground fishing reports from offshore have been very good.

York: Captain Phil Breton of Breton Charters had a promising report for the waters off of Cape Neddick. Mackerel fishing was very good from Bibb Rock all the way down to Nubble Light. Stripers were very cooperative, particularly along Long Sands and Short Sands beaches. Most of the fish are in the twenty-three to twenty-six-inch range, but he did land several keeper-sized fish between twenty-eight and thirty-five inches plus some over forty inches.

Goose Rocks Beach and Cape Porpoise: Captain Dave Rand reported fishing was much better this week. Mackerel were pushed into hiding in shallow water, but when located are very hungry. Chunk bait, live pollock and mackerel all worked well. There are plenty of stripers on the beaches around the Cape Porpoise islands and harbor.


Saco River and Saco Bay: Captain Cal Robinson of Saco Bay Guide Service told me finding bait is still a struggle and takes the best part of an hour to accomplish every day. There are not a lot of fish around. When you locate a good spot you can catch a few fish and

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#### Mr. Holland's Opus: A musical treat at the Playhouse

In an extraordinary event for a summer theater, the Ogunquit Playhouse celebrates its 90th Anniversary with the world premier presentation of Mr. Holland's Opus. The production is a spirited songfest with high energy, strong singing voices and a compelling love story.

The musical is based on the Golden Globe nominated 1995 film starring Richard Drevfuss and Glenne Headly. With music by Wayne Barker and lyrics and book by B.D. Wong, who also directed, the story follows the 39-year musical teaching career of Glenn Holland in Sacramento, California.

Akron Watson plays Holland with an exuberance and bravado that demonstrates Holland's passion for music and dream to write his own compositions.

Holland's wife, Iris, played by Anastasia Barzee, becomes the strong supportive wife and conscience that helps Holland face his family and career responsibilities.

Casting the lead characters demonstrates how far we have come in our acceptance of diversity and open-mindedness. Watson is African-American and Barzee is Caucasian. When the action of the play starts in 1969, such a mixed marriage would have faced serious consequences. Today, to the Ogunquit audience, it causes not a ripple of concern, in fact seems inspired.

Joshua Castille plays their son, Cole, who is born hearing impaired and speaks to us in sign language. He starts Act 2 with a rousing sign language song. With the help of the chorus, it shows he has turned what some might consider a disability into a force of communica-

Holland's obsession with his music and desire to motivate his students, along with difficulty dealing with his son's hearing loss, causes intense friction between them. Thanks to the loving concern of Holland's wife, they have an eventual emotional reconciliation.

The school's principal, Helen Chae-Jacobs, played by Veanne Cox, gives a no-nonsense, commanding performance that challenges and encourages Holland to

"push his students." Watch her expertise as she leads the student body, twilling a cheerleader's baton. This is matched by the titillating way she torments the imagination of her narrowminded, uptight assistant, Eugene Wolters, played by Timothy Gulan.

Holland befriends gym teacher Bill Meister, played as a good buddy, by Chris Orbach. Together they team up to outwit school administrator and grow old together in a strong friendship.

One of the ways Holland gets in trouble is by using Rock and Roll songs to develop a love of music in his students. At the time, Rock and Roll was considered a bad influence on American

Of the many students Holland taught, three in particular demonstrate his positive influence. Manny,

played by Rodrigo Torrejon, becomes an accomplished drummer. Gertrude, played by Angel Lin, starts as a shy clarinet player and matures to be elected as the state's governor. Rowena, played by Kai An Chee, one of Holland's more talented singers, who had a teenage crush on him, goes on to Broadway stardom.

The large cast keeps the momentum and spirit of the story growing to the climax, when Holland, long retired and filled with memories, is surprised when his students assemble to play the opus Holland dreamed of performing.

The inventive, avant garde set, designed by Lex Liang, uses lighting and visual effects to shift from Holland's home, various school locations and town settings.





**Q:** We have not had any luck buying a house as we have been outbid several times. That said, we have shifted our search over to land and will have a place built that works for us. Can you give me an overview of a good way to find the right lot? Thanks, Aaron

**A:** In terms of your investment, I would recommend that you evaluate the road access to the lot. This can mean a lot in terms of appeal of living there and managing the place in the snowy winter. You want a lot that has a level building site. You also want to touch base with neighbors and get a feel for the neighborhood, and if it will meet your needs. How well does the lot drain? Are there soft wet areas that indicate heavy water buildup? You want to check with the town as to any restrictions, easements, etc. It is a complicated process. You may want a builder or engineer to come and give you an opinion as well. The one result I like to eliminate in any real estate transaction is regret. The more careful you are the better.

**Q:** Shopping for a house. Looks as if we have found a perfect fit. It is brand new and built by a local builder. My husband is ready to make an offer and buy and move in. I have told him that from what I have read and heard it is best to have an inspection done even with a new home as you never know what is going on with it until you have it inspected. We are having a bit of conflict on this as he feels since the house is brand new having an inspection will be insulting to the builder. I told him we would reach out to you for your advice. Could I impose upon you to respond asap as we don't want to miss out on this one. Appreciate your help, Marlene

**A:** Yes, I definitely agree with you. No matter how great a house looks, even if just built, you never know what you are stepping into until you have your inspection. It is not an insult to the builder; it just confirms that you are being prudent and responsible. Get it done!
