

#### The Retro Roadtrip Report: **South Berwick to Kittery Point**

trip Report, a series of short, fun, and educational excursions that you can take here in beautiful southern Maine.

Begin your journey by fueling up with coffee and breakfast at the Early Bird Cafe on Main Street in South Berwick. This cozy café offers baked goods, breakfast burritos and sandwiches and more, all served fresh, local and with love. The specials change every day and you have to try their Main Street, South Ber-Witch's Brew (cold brew and choc milk).

Next, head out of the parking lot and turn left onto Rt. 236. In about a mile turn right onto Brattle Lane. Continue to Vaughan's Lane, where you will come upon the historic Hamilton House situated on the Salmon Falls River.


ton House is a preserved Georgian country house with beautiful architectural details, wallpaper and historical mural. The walking grounds and formal gardens are set in a stunning location. Tours are provided by Historic New England, one of the largest preservations organizations in the country.

Head east from South Berwick to Kittery, and continue on 236 through the Kittery traffic circle. Route 236 becomes Route 103; follow that over the Kittery Point bridge. Fort McClary State Park will be on your right.

The fort, officially estab-Welcome to the Retro Road- lished in 1808, has views of the Piscataqua River, Portsmouth Harbor Light and Whaleback Lighthouse. As you explore the fort, with its cannons, powder magazine and hexagonal blockhouse, you can almost see the soldiers who once stood guard here, ready to defend the coastline. It's a fantastic destination for history buffs and nature enthusiasts alike.



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#### Be the FIRST in Line!

#### Old Orchard Beach pier – an iconic Maine attraction schooner against the end played such an impor-

Old Orchard Beach got its name from an apple orchard started by Thomas Rogers in the mid-1600s. Since those early colonial years, Old Orchard Beach has grown in popularity as a vacation destination made famous by its pristine seven-mile beach.

In addition to the beach, one of the biggest attractions that encouraged visitors to come from Canada, Boston, New York and beyond was the iron pier first built in 1898. It was constructed by the Berlin Iron Bridge Company of East Berlin, Connecticut, for \$38,000. It stretched out to sea for 1,800 feet and earned the nickname the longest ocean pier in the world.

several pagoda-like structures, which contained a variety of pavilions, a casino and restaurant. Visitors came to the pier for dancing, concerts, lectures, dining, vaudeville entertainment, fishing, and to appreciate the spectacular Historical Society Muocean view.

To help travel the long distance back and forth, the pier provided a ride on narrow-gauge railcars. At the end of the pier, a V-shaped boat landing had a docking point for Boston-to-Portland passenger ships, plus all-day sailing excursions.

This first pier featured of the pier, causing the casino to crash into the Atlantic. The storm also ripped away 150 feet of the pier. The pier was rebuilt the following year, only to be destroyed and rebuilt several more times.

tant part of the town's history. Like the town, it has experienced serious disasters from fires and devastating destruction from brutal ocean storms. But it always came back to provide visitors with an unforgettable vacation experience."


A major fire that destroyed more than 100 buildings in the town in 1907 also demolished the entrance to the pier. Once again, it was reconstructed the next year.

Another disaster occurred in March of 1909 when a ferocious storm swept away the casino and 300-foot section in the middle of the pier. The damage was so extensive the owners shortened the

pier by 1,000 feet.

Rebuilt again, the casino ballroom grew in popularity and could hold as many as 5,000 people. They came to see movies, and to dance to famous big bands and hear major entertainers of the mid-1950s. As a major vacation attraction, the pier would be instrumental in establishing Old Orchard Beach as a resort area bringing more than one million visitors each year.




The 1969 fire that destroyed the entrance to the pier along with the carousel and Noah's Ark rides. Courtesy photo

Another fire in the town in 1923 destroyed several hotels along with the pier entrance and section of the boardwalk.


A third fire in 1969 destroyed the adjacent carousel and Noah's Arch rides, along with the opening section of the pier. The following year, the pier managers decided to remove the casino since the structure supporting it suffered from deterioration and could no longer support the 70-year-old building.

Rebuilt again, the pier suffered more devastating ocean storms in 1972 and 1978. These left the pier demolished, with only 100 feet remaining. Debris

from the pier got washed up along the beach and into the town square.

Today the pier has regained its place of honor as an imposing attraction for Old Orchard Beach. Rebuilt in 1980 to 485 feet, it features a restaurant at the pier's end. Stretching along the pier, visitors can enjoy a variety of souvenir shops, food, lounges, caricature drawings, personal photos and the fun and memories of a historic landmark.

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
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It wasn't so much a challenge as it was a suggestion, or perhaps an invitation. Yes, that's it: It was an invitation. So much more inviting than a challenge, which often comes off as challenging.

She had already gone off to school when I came downstairs for breakfast. The scent of egg and asparagus hung in the kitchen air. Half of that made sense to me. I mean, I like asparagus, but I also like pasta primavera – just not for breakfast. But Diane had tried a new recipe from a cook book that survived her recent book-purge, and she had left me a note inviting me to try it, too. And for a good reason.

The recipe bore the descriptive name, "Soft Boiled Egg with Asparagus Spears," supposedly a low-calorie and tasty meal (once enough salt and pepper are applied, I was sure). I brushed aside my bafflement at having asparagus for breakfast and studied the recipe.

It seemed pretty straightforward: "Take a medium egg, place in a pan of cold water. Bring to the boil and allow to simmer for 3-4 minutes. Take 5 asparagus spears, trim the ends and either add to the boiling water with the egg, or steam for 3-4 minutes. And that's it.

Now, the trick is – and this is why Diane invited me to try to recipe – the trick is to successfully create a soft boiled egg. The person who wrote the recipe either: A. assumed that the reader knows how to prepare a soft boiled egg

no idea how to prepare a soft boiled egg for consumption and was wishing the reader the best of luck. Yes, we are told how to boil it, but we are not told it's been boiled and - most crucially – how to peel it.

For those of you who are pros at this, two things: 1. There's no need to brag, and 2. Neither Di nor I had ever made soft-boiled eggs – or hard-boiled eggs either. Fried eggs, scrambled eggs, omelets, even poached eggs...but never boiled. I'm not sure why that is. Perhaps a deepseated insecurity over an inability to peel eggs? But how would we know that unless we tried?

For advice, naturally, I went online. Everybody and their uncle has a You-Tube video on how to do anything from splitting an atom to playing "Stairway to Heaven" on a soprano ukulele, so I figured it would be reasonable to find someone peeling an

wasn't wrong. It's somewhat unsettling that there are so many people out there willing to take the time to film themselves boiling and peeling an egg. And it's even more unsettling that there are so many people out there who pass themselves off as experts at boiling and peeling eggs.

With multiple methods offered, I did what I usually do, which is to create a hybrid methodology by taking tips from various eggs-perts (I'm so sorry about that; I had no control over that one), then adjusting the recipe every time I do it, keeping the tweaks that improve the final product, and scrapping the ones that don't.

Am I ready to post

No, and not just because I don't know how. It's because I'm still working my way toward eggscellence (hey, I'm not happy about this either). how to handle the egg after To date, what works best is placing the egg in cool water so it's just covered, crank it to 10, and when it starts to boil, turn it down to 8 for eggs-actly three minutes (somebody stop me). Then I remove the egg with a slotted spoon and place it in a bowl of cool water for a few seconds, remove it, crack both ends of the egg on a plate, then return the egg to the bowl of water for 30 seconds (this supposedly helps in the peeling process). The fun part is then com

for consumption, or B. had my own YouTube video? using your fingernails to gingerly peel the shell from the egg. Only twice have I ended up with a shiny smooth specimen; mostly it's been a series of pock-marked oblong

That shouldn't bother me. But it does. I mean, once an egg enters my mouth, it's going to look seriously unattractive, so what does it matter if it looks imperfect just before going in? I wish that was a rhetorical question.

If anyone has a foolproof way to peel a softboiled egg, I'm happy to accept suggestions. In the meantime, I'll just keep eggs-perimenting (sigh)

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

George C. Harrington, who has served as President of Friends of Hope Cemetery & Woods board since its creation in 2016, has retired. Under Harrington's leadership, \$1.4M was raised through a conservation easement, held by Kennebunk Land Trust to preserve Hope Woods for future generations. He led the project to create an Accessible Trail in Hope Woods for all to enjoy, including those with mobility challenges. He is quick to point out that these projects required the work of many, but without George, these projects would not have been so successful. It all began when Hope Cemetery Board President Betsy Stevens invited him to take a walk in the woods with her.

"By the end of the walk I had ignored all protocols for how to properly recruit new board members and asked if George would join the Hope Cemetery Board of Directors," said Stevens. "He said 'Yes.' And the rest is history."

A resolution made by the Hope Cemetery Board of Directors sums it up:

"The Board of Directors of Hope Cemetery Corporation extend their gratitude to George C. Harrington for his generosity of time and resources that were foremost in the creation of the Friends of Hope Cemetery & Woods and in the campaign to protect Hope Woods under a conservation easement. His leadership and dedication to the Board and his service as President of the Friends of Hope Cemetery & Woods have been indispensable. With utmost appreciation, we thank you."

A visit to Hope Woods is a truly wonderful experience. Guided walks with Gordon Collins, master naturalist, will be offered on Sat. Aug 19 at 10AM, Sun., Sept. 17 at 1PM, Oct. 14 at 10AM and Sun, Nov. 12 at 1PM. Hope Woods is open daily from dawn to dusk. 

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# A chef, a groovy gadget – and strawberries!

# Cooking is a hobby we both enjoy

Ron and Ellen Gerard live in a summer cottage with a spacious deck overlooking Damariscotta Lake. They spend winters in warmer climes. But wherever home is, they are "passionate" about cooking.

Ellen, a former "Miss Maine" who was crowned in 1964, occasionally posts Ron's creative recipes on Facebook, many of which have me drooling. With good reason: after graduating from the Cornell School of Hotel Administration, Ron interned at Maxim's in Paris (Three Stars in the Michelin guide) before returning to the United States and managing Anthony's Pier 4 Restaurant in Boston in the late 1960s.

But Ron wasn't keen about the restaurant business – he just liked to cook! So on weekends and "down time" from his busy stockbroker job at Merrill Lynch, Ron created and tweaked recipes. He even enjoyed a brief correspondence with Mrs. Paul Child (aka Julia) and James Beard.

His sous chef Ellen graciously shared several of Ron's creations for Kitchen Talk. "We love to experiment," Ellen says. "Cooking is a hobby we both enjoy and do together."

Following are two Ron originals!

#### **Ron's Roasted Peppers**

Ingredients:

2 red peppers

2 yellow peppers (be aware: they don't roast as well as red ones)

Salt and pepper

8 cloves of garlic, roughly chopped

Oregano (a pinch)

Thyme (a smidgen)

Fresh chopped Italian parsley (big dab) (Ron calls that his "PDS Method": pinch, dab, smidgen)

#### Directions:

If you have a gas stove, put peppers directly on the flame and cook until black, rotating as needed. They will be softer when they are completely black.

On an electric stove, use broiler to blacken.

Then, place blackened peppers in a paper bag, close tightly,

and let them steam for 15 minutes.

Peel off all the black (DO NOT rinse with water) and remove seeds.

Slice peppers, add garlic, plus "PDS method" of oregano, thyme, parsley, salt/pepper. Put all ingredients in a bowl or jar, cover with extra virgin olive oil, and let marinate

in refrigerator for at least several hours, preferably overnight.

Delicious as a side or served as an appetizer with crusty bread.

# Ron's Lobster Sauce Taking Pasta to the Penthouse!

Ingredients:

2 cooked lobsters (save carcasses – they're used

in the sauce for added flavor)

1/3 cup olive oil

20 cloves of garlic

1 tbsp. coarse ground black pepper

1 glass dry white wine (i.e. Pinot Grigio)

1 bottle lobster or clam juice

128-oz. can Cento San Marzano peeled tomatoes, pureed

1 tsp. oregano

Lots of basil

1 box De Cecco thin spaghetti

Grated parmesan or pecorino cheese

#### Directions:

Cook garlic and pepper in olive oil until golden, then remove and reserve the garlic.

Add lobster carcasses to the olive oil and saute 2 minutes.

Add wine and simmer for 2 minutes.

Add tomatoes, reserved garlic, lobster or clam juice, oregano and basil.

Simmer until sauce thickens to a nice consistency (not too thick).

Just before serving, remove lobster carcasses from sauce and add chopped meat from two lobsters to the sauce.

Serve over spaghetti and top with parmesan or pecorino cheese.

#### Groovy Gadget My step-daughter Amy just gave me a

Baggy Rack Holder. She saw this clever gizmo on the "Today" show. (It's available from Amazon for under \$5.) The Baggy Rack Holder is like having an extra set of hands in the kitchen. Simply slip any size ziplock or plastic storage bag under the side clips, then pour leftover spaghetti sauce, cucumber soup or liquid/moist leftovers without spilling a drop on the counter. (The clips hold the bag firm and steady). Other cool features: adjustable height for larger bags plus nonslip rubber base. What did I do without this? I cleaned up a lot of wet messes. No more!



Once you fasten the ziplock bag under the clips, it's ready to be filled with no spills.

# Strawberry Fields Forever

MAINE COOKING

I'm a fan of Robert P. Tristram Coffin's *Maine Cooking: Old Time Secrets*. I discovered this delightful paperback (printed in 1991) several years ago at Douglas Harding Rare Books in Wells, and consult it frequently. It's not only a compilation of cooking tips and helpful hints, it's an absolute joy to read.

Here's what he wrote about wild strawberries which happen to be in full bloom now. "Wild strawberries are the best berries of summer. They are like first love. All the later ones are anticlimaxes. I have never, for sheer breathlessness and abandon, been able to match that first love I knew. It was when I was seven."

To gather wild strawberries, you must "go on your hands and knees in green velvet. Of course, you shouldn't wear your white flannels, or a very light evening gown because strawberry stains are hard to get out."

Once you've gathered a bucketful or two, "the berries are not to be cooked. They are to be eaten alive. Au natural. Not in the nude ... but concocted. And the connoting is an exquisite process."

Coffin's concocting starts with using a pestle of white pine ("no other wood will do, for any other wood will taint the berries"). Place berries in earthen-ware dish and squash with pestle to a red pulp. ("A part of the magic is in the seeds and you must release that.") "Add sugar to the amount of about one-half the pulp."

Then comes the **cream.** "Two quarts real cream ... the thick yellow, day-old kind .... the kind that has risen on old fashioned wide pans of milk." Using only a **wooden spoon**, stir until pink ("like a shy wild-rose") and let it age overnight in a cool spot. (If you put it in your basement, "padlock the cellar door," he insists.)

The next day at noon, put the berry-filled crock in the center of the lunch table, next to a plate of "hot cream-of-tartar biscuits." Coffin adds, "This strawberry cream is the main dish, mark you, the only dish. There is no other dish in the universe to go with it. Wild strawberry cream is the high tide of summer." It's also a delicious lunch!


#### **Favorite character?**

#### Saltwater Fishing Report – improving sea conditions

by Captain Greg Metcalf Saltwater fishing in Southern Maine was a mixed bag this past week.

The offshore fishing was phenomenal with excellent catches of haddock, jumbo red fish and pollock. Recent weather conditions have resulted in good but slightly slower fishing activity for striped bass anglers.

Kennebunkport: Fishing from Cape Porpoise to Wells Bay was a bit slower this week, mostly due to all the rain. Mackerel were scarce and finicky if you found them. Anglers aboard my boat, the Striper Swiper enjoyed some decent catches of stripers but really had to work for

Water temperatures warmed up drastically early in the week to 70 degrees but has started to drop back to the mid to high sixties. Things are sure to improve this week.

Wells, Ögunquit: Brandy from Webhannet River Bait and Tackle told me striper fishing the river mouths has slowed a bit over the last week. She heard of more consistent action in the surf between Parson and Moody Beaches. Keeper-sized stripers continue to take chunk and live mackerel and live a safe bet this past week.

Asteroid City

I've loved every Wes Anderson movie I've ever seen in the theater, including my first, Rushmore (1998), and all the others, including The Royal Tenenbaums Fox (2009), Moonrise Kingdom (2012), and Isle of Dogs

(2018). I'm sorry to say I can't add Asteroid City to the list.

Yes, he's always been a whimsical director with a unique visual style that sets him apart from his peers, but - and here's the thing – he's always made me laugh. Wit is one thing, but humor is another, and while his latest offering, with a color palette straight off a vintage 1950s postcard, is highly clever, it just isn't funny. I believe (2001), [[The Fantastic Mr. I laughed twice. Otherwise, I sat there with a faint smile on my face, appreciative of

into the making of the film, but disappointed that it simply wasn't funny – even though it had all the ingredients for a full-fledged comedy.

I think that's what made is such a drag for me – it was so close to being hysterically funny. I mean, you've got a family quarantined in a tiny desert town for a reason involving an alien, with the characters played by actors capable of comedy, like Jason Schwartzman, Edward Norton, Tom Hanks, Scarlett Johansson, Steve Carell, and Bryan Cranston. And – get this – the alien is played by Jeff Goldblum. How perfect is that? And yet is he given any lines that would have us rolling in the aisles? No. Just one muttered line. Talk about a wasted opportunity.

Also troublesome for me was that instead of shooting it as a '50s sci-fi comedy, Anderson, who co-wrote the script with Roman Coppola, opted to present the story as a meta movie-within-amovie, which, while clever, has been done before, and with more satisfying results. So yeah, I don't need to see this one again.

Indiana Jones and the Dial of Destinu

I'm still glowing. Don't you love that feeling that stays with you days after seeing a movie - that feeling of joy and excitement of having been thrilled and amused, that feeling of gratitude for the team that creand satisfying film? Me too.

When he and director Steven Spielberg came out with Raiders of the Lost Ark in 1981, producer George Lucas said the plan was to make five Indiana Jones movies. And so they did. The first one was revolutionary in how retro it was, giving audiences a straightout 1940's-style adventure movie. The second one, [[Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom]] (1984) was a colossal drag; many people blamed Kate Capshaw, but the fact is, it had a lousy, lifeless, humorless script which Spielberg foolishly didn't send back to the drawing adventure that started 25 board.

The third one, made partly because Spielberg wanted to atone for Temple of Doom, was the terrific *Indiana Jones* and the Last Crusade (1989), with the brilliant casting decision of Sean Connery for Indy's dad; it was better than the first instalment, and audiences responded by flooding the cinemas. After a 19-year hiatus, Spielberg and Lucas, along with star Harrison Ford, returned with Indiana Iones and the Kingdom of the Crystal Skull, a muddled Cold War tale that like he's in his 40s again is was marred by the inclusion of Shia LaBeouf as a Marlon Brando-wannabe sidekick.

And now, at last, the final Indiana Jones movie, which – let's just get this over with - includes enough hope. And that's enough age-related jokes to address

idiots who have a problem *Destiny*, which features with a 79-year-old actor starring in an action movie. Ford, who has always maintained a fit physique, is utterly believable as the famed archaeologist who, upon his retirement from academia in 1969, is thrust into an years earlier.


Which brings us to the film's opener, a ridiculously exciting segment that finally gives us what we had missed, what with the first three films set in the 1930s and the fourth in 1957: Indiana Jones fighting Nazis during WWII. Aboard a train, no less. In short, it involves a supernatural relic prized by the Nazis that Indy, naturally, wants to preserve for history. (Of note: the de-aging CGI used to make Ford look freakishly convincing.)

When the film jumps to 1969, that relic will pop up again, along with wait for it - more Nazis, who have not yet given up of the plot; it's best to be the concerns of all those surprised by The Dial of Destiny in the theater again.

Phoebe Waller-Bridge as Indy's resourceful goddaughter, Mads Mikkelsen as a persistent Nazi, and John Rhys-Davies as Indy's old pal Sallah, making his third appearance in the

Spielberg made what, at first, seemed like a foolish decision, abdicating the director's chair in this last Indiana Jones movie in order to produce (along with Lucas). But James Mangold did such a great job here, it caused Spielberg to reportedly exclaim, after seeing the finished product for the first time, "I thought I was the only one who could make these things!"

The action sequences are amazing and the humor plentiful, with just enough references to the previous films (and their characters) to please longtime fans. As far as series enders go, it's right up there alongside Daniel Craig's farewell to James Bond in No Time to Die (2021). I may wait a few weeks, but I'll be seeing Indiana Jones and the Dial of















# Through the Lens with Bob Dennis






