


Turning to the left, there are camel and little pony rides. I decided to take a ride while reading our venerable publication - good reading indeed. While I am a bit of a horseback rider, riding the humped-back camel named "Tucker" was very adventuresome. For one token, you get to ride around the pen – it ended far too quickly. I will certainly do this again.

Further along, you are greeted by an active group of gibbons – boy, are they chatty and social in their enclosed tree forest.

Along the way, we took in the leaping lemurs, jumping red-tailed monkeys, a family of ze-

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bras, two large, colorful of young goats for petting and feeding.

Then, we entered the parakeet encounter – a spacious feeding experience, where the 300-plus pastel-colored tiny budgerigars flew around in a friendly fashion. Visitors can hold food sticks (\$2.50) to get a closer encounter with the birds. I felt like singing "Mister Bluebird is on my shoulder."

Other animals did not disappoint: a sloth just hanging out; a pen of fallow deer (another feeding experience); a few kangaroos, two scary-looking alligators and playful river otters in their jacuzzi-like flowing river pool.

Then you come upon the lioness and lion resting in the vast field. I started singing again, ". . . In the jungle, the mighty jungle, the lion sleeps tonight!" To see them was both calming and daunting at the same time.

Macaws and a large pen airy 5,500 sq.ft. Butterfly Kingdom featuring South and Central American butterflies (I counted 7 different types). I visited during the morning when they were particularly active flying around the greenhouse enclosure. One even landed on my son's full and wavy locks. Within the trees of this sanctuary, we witnessed the beautiful and sometimes iridescent wings of these graceful insects.

Lions and tigers and bears – oh my? Well, no bears – Maine's got plenty of them in the wild. There was so much to take in. For the \$17.25 admission, it is well worth your money. Plan a full half-day at the Kingdom as they also have an 18-hole mini golf course, 13 kiddie rides (Go-Karts and bumper cars, too) and, to be expected, sumptuous fried dough – all within steps of Short Sands Beach.



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

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


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Reinventing a community market in Eliot

The people's anguish and longing will end next month. Since June, they have been deprived of that which they had come to love. The creator, however, swears she will resume making it in September.

"I know people are suffering from soup withdrawal," said Hannah Makuck, who owns Maine Market at 177 Moses Gerrish Farmer Road in Eliot with husband Jordan Hickey. "But I needed a soup-break."

No surprise there. Maine Market opened last October, during an especially lovely autumn perfect soup weather. From the get-go, Heather's made-from-scratch offerings included two

When her family moved to York Beach when she was 14, Hannah became best friends with the daughter of Mark is how she described the Meehan, who co-owned the Meet Market. As such, she had an inside scoop on the market; during the pandemic, when it became clear that the owners of the market were open to selling it, Hannah (who

for small businesses) and Jordan decided to take the plunge.

Jordan, who was making surfboards at the time (and still does), undertook and beverage industry a complete renovation of the 1,800-square-foot store with Hannah's brother-inlaw Seth King. The partnership was a natural, as Jordan and Seth are builders together. The renovation job started shortly after the couple bought the property in July 2022; they opened the market (and moved in upstairs with son Finnbar) three months later.

"It was always going to be a breakfast/lunch place with wine and beer and soup, because those are all things I love," said Hanwas an account manager nah, who works alongside

and social media manager her sister Katlyn King and that Hannah has come to best friend Lucia Tenuta, who used to manage Darwin's in Harvard Square in Boston.

"We were in the food together in our twenties," said Hannah, who refers to the experienced Lucia as "my boss." The trio makes virtually everything from scratch, including the popular scones (using Iordan's mother's recipe), the Breakfast Bulkie ("It's the Connecticut in me" savs Hannah of her use of a hard roll for the breakfast sandwich), falafel, marinated tofu Italian subs, and lunch sandwiches with Boar's Head meats. (Though plenty of glutenfree items are offered, Hannah notes that it is not a certified GF kitchen.)

Some elements of the old convenience store exist, like eggs, orange juice, beer, and wine; however, there's no doubt that the market underwent a major reinvention – one

discover the community wanted. Business has been so brisk that she often finds it overwhelming – but in a good way.

"We want people to feel happy and healthy and full," she said. To enhance the community vibe, Maine Market offers a beer or wine tasting every third Friday from 5 to 7PM (check their Facebook page or Instagram for details). "We've also grilled burgers and dogs out in the parking lot, and have had local businesses do pop-ups here," including a plant seedlings workshop and a ceramicist clinic.

'We've enjoyed a healthy mix of old regulars and new regulars," she said. "Some people who didn't think they'd like a new thing, do like it."

And they're bound to like it even more when soup's on again in September.

The Most Popular Salad – at our Golf Luncheon

After Ladies Day at Webhannet Golf Club in Kennebunk Beach, we gather upstairs in the century-old shingled clubhouse for lunch. Home-made salads, sandwiches and desserts are placed on cloth-covered tables topped with technicolor bouquets of hydrangeas, roses and dahlias. Not fancy, just lovely.

Last week one salad kept receiving raves, kudos and requests from everyone. It's an oldie but goodie, and Jennifer, who brought the crunch ramen noodle salad, admitted it's been her go-to summer salad for years.

Of course I got the recipe! Here it is:

Jennifer Houston's Ramen Noodle Salad

Serve 8, easily doubled for a crowd.

Ingredients:

1 16-oz. bag coleslaw mix

2 3-oz. packages of ramen noodles, crumbled, without the seasoning. Use any brand of packaged noodles)

1 cup shelled/cooked edamame

1 avocado, peeled, pitted and diced

I mango, peeled, pitted and julienned

1/2 cup thinly sliced almonds

1/2 cup thinly sliced scallions

Sesame honey vinaigrette (see ingredients below)

Sesame Honey Vinaigrette ingredients:

1/2 cup avocado oil (vegetable oil works too)

1/4 cup honey (or your desired sweetness)

2 tsp. soy sauce

1/4 tsp. toasted sesame oil

Pinch of salt/pepper

Whisk all these ingredients until combined.

Salad Directions:

Heat oven to 425F.

Spread crumbled ramen noodles and sliced almonds out on a baking sheet, then stir to combine. Bake 5 minutes or until almonds and noodles are slightly toasted and golden.

Remove baking sheet and give the mixture a good stir, then return to oven and toast an additional 3 minutes. Keep a close eye on the mixture so it doesn't burn. Remove and set aside.

Mix ingredients (including vinaigrette) in a large bowl and toss until well combined.

Serve immediately or cover and refrigerate for up to 3 days.

Jennifer's honed tips: This salad is much better eaten the first day as the noodles lose their crunch the longer it sits. Also, the avocado may brown a bit. I frequently leave out the mango and use approximately 1 1/2 times the slaw mix; sometimes I try a mixture of cabbage slaw and broccoli slaw. It's fun to vary the salad. Just be sure to pour in ALL the dressing.



Blueberry **Muffins** – Who Knew?

I always added more blueberries to my muffins than the recipe called for. Thought it would bolster their flavor. But guess what?

Those blueberries sank right to the bottom. The muffins looked more like blueberry layer cake.

But I discovered that by simmering a cup of blueberries on the stove for about 10 minutes, then mixing that concentrated jam with a cup of fresh blueberries, and then gently stirring that concoction into the dough, the muffins were replete with blueberries ... from top to bottom.

Perfection.

And now for two refreshing summer appetizers for cocktails on the deck at dusk. . .

Cucumbers are tumbling out of the bins at farm stands. In my backyard veggie garden, they're multiplying overnight. Here's a simple recipe that I've used for years to take advantage of these abundant in-season veggies.

Feta with Cucumbers on Toast

Ingredients:

1/2 baguette

6 tsps. extra-virgin olive oil

3 oz. feta

1/2 tsp. fresh lemon juice

Coarse salt and ground pepper

1 small English cucumber, thinly sliced crosswise

Preheat oven to 450 degrees.

Split baguette lengthwise and lightly brush cut sides with 2 tsp. olive oil. Bake 5 minutes or until golden around edges.

In small bowl, mash feta, 4 tsp. oil, and lemon juice with a fork. Season with salt and pepper.

Spread feta mixture evenly over toasted baguette and top with cucumber.

Season with salt, pepper, lemon juice, and a drizzle of oil.

Cut into pieces to serve.

White Bean Hummus with a Touch of Lemon

Makes 1 3/4 cups

Ingredients:

1 can (15-oz.) white beans such as cannellini,

drained, 2 tbsp. liquid reserved

1/4 cup tahini

1/3 cup fresh lemon juice (approx. 2 lemons)

2 tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil

1 small garlic clove

Coarse salt

Directions:

Puree beans, tahini, lemon juice, oil and garlic in food processor until smooth. Add reserved bean liquid as needed to thin hummus to attain desired consistency. Season generously with salt, then refrigerate. (Keeps up to 2 days in the refrigerator).

Hint: if you're feeling posh, serve the hummus in a crystal martini glass!

A Recipe from County Clare, Ireland...

Tasted it meself, I did, in a wood-paneled pub not far from the fabled Burren. When I told the chef I was from Maine where chowders are cherished, he gladly gave me the recipe. It's a perfect entree for that first cool August evening.



Corn and Shellfish Chowder

Serves 4

Ingredients: 2 tbsp. butter

1 small onion, chopped

12-oz. sweet corn (cut from the cob)

21/2 cups milk

2 scallions, finely chopped

1 cup peeled and cooked shrimp

(Note: prawns are preferred but....shrimp work)

6-oz. fresh white crabmeat

1/4 cup cream

Pinch of cayenne pepper, salt and

ground black pepper

4 whole shrimp (or prawns) in the shell to garnish (if desired)

Directions:

Melt butter in large saucepan and fry onion for 4-5 minutes until soft.

Reserve 2 tbsp. corn for garnish, then add remainder to the pan, along with the milk.

Bring to a boil, reduce heat, cover and simmer over low for 5 minutes.

Pour soup in batches into blender or food processor. Process until smooth.

Return soup to pan. Stir in scallions, crabmeat, shrimp, cream and cayenne pepper. Reheat gently over low heat. Meanwhile, place reserved corn kernels in small frying pan without oil and dry-fry over moderate heat until golden and toasted.

Season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve each bowl of soup garnished with a few of the toasted corn. (Garnish with 4 extra shrimp in shell.)

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





Southern Maine Saltwater Fishing Report

It was another good week of fishing along the Southern Maine coastline. Mackerel were a bit more difficult to catch than the previous week, but still available if you looked for them. Striped bass continued to be cooperative. There are plenty of small school-size fish, and good numbers of fish from twenty-six to thirty-two inches in length.

Kennebunkport: The fishing from Cape Porpoise to Wells Bay has been relatively steady. Some days are a little more challenging than others and require some extra patience, but there is plenty of bait and a decent body of stripers in

The Kennebunk River has been producing some impressive catches of stripers including several keep-

Wells, Ogunquit: Webhannet River Bait and Tackle reported that striper fish-

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
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The Secret Life of the American Musical

The Secret Life of the American Musical – How Broadway Shows are Built

a Book Review by Steve Hrehovcik

In 19 chapters Viertel takes us behind the curtain to examine the architecture of a Broadway musical. Viertel uses hundreds of examples of musicals that starts with Oklahoma in 1943 and ends with A Chorus Line in 1975.

Viertel's introduction becomes a "tuning up" as his inspiration for writing the book. He follows with the Overture which sets the mood for what the audience is about to see.

Next Viertel describes what happens when the curtain goes up with the "I want" number. Perfect examples of the "I want" is Eliza Doolittle singing "All I Want Is A Room Somewhere" in *My Fair Lady* and "I Want to be a Producer" from *The Producers*. The love interests, the subplots, the villains, how the plot thickens all get examined with Viertel's expert analysis.

Working through the scenes until the end of Act I, Viertel reveals how important it is for the story to have piqued the audience's attention, so they come back after the intermission.

When the curtain rises on Act 2, Viertel describes what he calls "throwaway numbers." Examples of these are "This Was A Real Nice Clambake" in *Carousel* and "Too Darn Hot" in *Kiss Me, Kate*. None of these numbers affect the major plot. But they prepare the audience for the action, battles, climax and resolution to follow when the show ends.

Viertel held an executive position for a New York company that owned five theaters. He was involved in a number of Pulitzer Prize and Tony Award winning shows. Viertel was artistic director on New York City Center's Encores! Series and taught musical theater.

Thanks to Viertel's book, the secret of the American musical is no longer a mystery. The book is available on Amazon Books.
