

I will be looking for ways to do so, right along with you.





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Setting down roots on an Arundel farm

Zoë handed me a psychedelic gumdrop. Having been assured that I was not about to go on some psychotropic journey, I popped the yellow and orange flower head into my mouth, chewed, and waited. It didn't take long. Within seconds, my mouth tingling as loaded up with Pop Rocks (but without the sugar), I appreciated the herb's other nickname: buzz buttons.

Zoë Shwidock and her best bud and business partner, Nicole Heker, had likewise ingested the herb spilanthes. When they mentioned how one of the side effects was salivation, I said, "Good. I'm glad it's not just me." Come to find, spilanthes is one of the most potent and safe antiviral and antibacterial herbs. With immune-boosting and anti-inflammatory properties, it can be used in teas and tinctures or, as

While doing deliveries for Girard, they became acquainted with Noah Wentworth at Frinklepod Farm in Arundel; when Zoë and Nicole learned that Noah was looking for someone to farm a half-acre plot he was leasing, they took the plunge and decided to sublet it from him for three years.

The women were not looking to farm, but their paths naturally led to the decision. As Nicole said, "When a door opened, we walked through it."

Zoë agreed, saying, "It's never felt forced."

Noah tilled and composted the land (heavy with clay) and created a few beds for them; since then, Wild Few has been a till-free herb farm; with the least amount of disturbance, the soil releases less carbon, which is needed for more healthy plant life. (To further

build carbon and nitrogen in the soil, they have planted cover crops like clover, oats, and peas.)

For their first year, Zoë and Nicole planted medicinal herbs – including anise hyssop, wild white yarrow, calendula, bee balm, blue vervain, elecampane root, lemon balm, and marshmallow leaf – strictly for wholesale, doing all the work themselves. Because of who have long resisted the three-year lease, they avoided herbs that would need a longer time to establish themselves. This year, they've expanded to retail and online sales, while resisting the urge to plant more crops on their half acre.

The herbs that they do yield are dried on the premises in handmade *com*

bins, then stored temporarily in plastic tubs before being transported to their Biddeford apartment. With a home processing license, they're able to do the final work on a newly made garbling table of separating the flowers and leaves from the stems (at a rate of one hour per pound of dried herbs).

For a couple of women putting down roots, they have become attached to their joint endeavor, which has yielded pleasing results.

'Oh yeah, I would like to re-up for another few years," said Nicole, as Zoë nodded. "The wind's at our backs.'



One of the projects that helped launch Zahares' art career was illustrating children's books. His first children's book, Window Music, was published in 1998. Before creating art for children's books, most of Zahares' art featured landscapes, cityscapes and buildings. Children's books introduced him to drawing animals. Time magazine and The New York Times honored his book as among the best picture books of the year.

Zahares has had eight children's books published, including Frosty the Snowman, which includes a CD featuring three songs by Grammy Award winner Kenny Loggins. His next book will be Wonders of the World, due out in 2025.

In addition to children's books, Zahares has earned commissions from Boston Duck Tours, Bank of America, McDonald's, HBO, Cinemax, plus Family Circle and Sesame Street magazines. His art is also represented in the permanent collection of the deCordova Museum in Lincoln, Massachusetts, and Addison Gallery of America Art in Andover, Massachusetts.

He has also had several solo shows in Maine, Massachusetts and Vermont, plus participated in numerous group shows. He also created murals, and has prints, puzzles, note cards and other artwork available.

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

A Walking Tour – and more!

A culinary walking tour through the Old Port

Bon Appetit christened Portland, Maine, as "America's Foodiest Small Town." The Food Network cited the city as being one of its "Top Five Most Delicious Destinations."

So when Maine Day Ventures asked me to join a tasting tour at several restaurants in the Old Port, my appetite and interest were seriously stoked.

Two weeks ago on a Friday, I met our guide Timothy plus nine other tourists for a three hour walk through the Old Port to sample some of the city's signature treats. Our group included a family of five from England (their three teens had just finished attending camp in northern Maine) plus four ladies from Illinois. I was the lone local.

Strolling along the cobblestone streets, I tasted signature Maine dishes and learned fascinating historic nuggets about this peninsular city on Casco Bay. Guide Timothy, a tall lanky guy with a wicked sense of humor and sincere passion for his home town, shared knowledge about the local food scene while also educating us on lobstering and haddock fishing, the difference between high and low bush blueberries, the Great Fire of 1866 when half the city burned to the ground – and the fact that there are 1000 taps of local craft beer up and down Commercial Street!

I finished the tour with a sated appetite and a brain full of new information – a delicious and satisfying combination.

Here's our route:

We started at **Andy's Old Port Pub** (94 Commercial Street) where I devoured a delectable fish taco – crispy pan-seared haddock atop minced ripe tomatoes and a touch of pickled sauerkraut, all doused with fresh lime juice and nestled in a corn taco. I washed this down with a refreshing Island Dog craft beer. Andy's Old Port Pub features simple wooden tables and fun wall art, a back room pool table with acoustic music nightly, and a place I'll revisit just to sample their fish & chips (or, surprise surprise, another fish taco!).

Next stop was **Gilbert's Chowder House** (92 Commercial Street) to taste what Timothy promised was "the best New England clam chowder anywhere!" Truth in advertising (and I'm a chowder connoisseur): it was.

But equally flavorsome was Gilbert's seafood chowder. (Yes, I tasted both chowders.) I even dabbed a few drops of Tabasco in the broth which Timothy assured me "will take it to a new level." (It did.) Our group sat outside under the tent on the back deck at red wooden picnic tables as a gentle sea breeze confirmed the nautical setting. (I truly didn't want to leave this place.)

Timothy then led us along "fish alley," the saltiest and most genuine part of Portland's working waterfront. It's also adjacent to the historic Custom House Wharf. As we watched fishing boats bob in the rising tide, our guide described many of the small islands throughout Casco Bay (slightly less than 300), and cited his favorites for day trips.

Next was **Rigby Yard** (50 Wharf Street) where Portland's old train depot once served as a railway link throughout the northeast. This industrial brewhouse offers 20 Maine craft beers on tap and "elevated" bar fare. With its high brick walls, large open fireplace and lounge area, Rigby Yard pulses with a cool vibe. Of special note: every day around 4 PM, they close and then reopen an hour later with a different dinner menu.

And the lobster roll. Mother of God! Large whole claws lightly sautéed in butter, then delicately dabbed with homemade mayonnaise and served atop shredded fresh lettuce in a traditional grilled bun. These lobster rolls received raves from our group. As did Rigby Yard's home-made potato chips, made from Russets that had been cultivated way up Maine in Aroostook, aka "the County."

Our final destination was **Dean's Sweets** (475 Fore Street) to taste home-made "needhams," aka "the candy of Maine," or "Maine potato candy." These confections originated in Portland in the early 1870s when a candy maker attended an evangelistic service there and sensed something heavenly in the air. He mixed coconut with mashed potatoes and confectionary sugar, then dipped the concoction in sweet chocolate: voila, the needham. Dean's also features truffles of every flavor and size; all are sinfully delicious.

The three hours passed too quickly, but I left the Old Port knowing that the city's nation-wide foodie reputation is well deserved. I was also glad I'd worn flat comfortable walking shoes on those cobblestone streets.

In addition to their Old Port Culinary tour, they feature a World of Flavors tour in Portland (sampling traditional Japanese cuisine at Sapporo, Indian specialties at Hi Bombay, authentic Mexican food at Lenora, and Lebanese-Mediterranean coffees and desserts at Olive Cafe).

They also offer a Tasty Lunchtime Walking tour of Kennebunkport (with stops at the Clam Shack, Federal Jack's, Mornings in Paris and FiaFia for smoothie drinks and bowls); plus a Casco Bay Oyster Cruise to sample three local varieties.

What a shop – two floors of fine kitchenware, gorgeous linens, ample aprons, unusual gourmet food, unique "rubs" (I bought Rusty's Rib Rub), and handy gadgets for every culinary task.


Maybe because my little Victory Garden out back is replete with summer squashes, I was particularly taken with the OXO Hand-Held Spiralizer. This nifty tool creates curly vegetable "noodles" from zukes and cukes, or any long vegetable. With a simple twist, you can make curly fries or a special salad garnish. It was another excellent week of fishing along the Southern Maine coastline this week. Boaters have been enjoying nice weather for the most part. There have been a few days of rough seas, mostly in the afternoons, but overall, the weather has been favorable.

Anglers enjoyed tangling the first blast of first blast of bluefish to invade our waters

There were a couple of days of hot and heavy action before they continued on their way. Hopefully they come back to visit and stay a bit longer next time. Stripers are still abundant and are being caught from the surf, boats and kayaks.

Kennebunkport: The fishing from Cape Porpoise to Wells Bay was good during the week. Big schools of mackerel were easy to locate by drifting or trolling Sabiki

Fishing along the beaches and Ocean Avenue shoreline was difficult due to an abundance of seaweed that moved in from the offshore waters due to some recent southerly wind. The anglers that fought through the inconvenience and persevered were rewarded with some quality fish.

Anglers aboard my boat the Striper *Swiper* caught some very nice keepersize striped bass this week, the biggest being a 31inch fish. The Kennebunk River also is full of stripers of all sizes from 12 inches to jumbo-sized 40-inch fish. Biggest fish of the week was a

Wells, Ogunquit: Webhannet Tackle told me both surf and boat fisherman reported a lot of weed on the beaches this week, yet 30-plus-inchsized stripers were very common, as were many school-sized fish.



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

Q: We have been looking to buy a house for several weeks. I have been representing my wife and I in the process and have not had much success in our negotiations, etc. My friends all tell me that i need to have a broker who is working for us and guiding us through the negotiations, etc. That really seems unnecessary to me as I have been in business for many years and i know how to make things work. I have thought that if I do not have a broker, I can buy the house for less as there is only one broker in the transaction that is getting a commission. Just wondering what your thoughts are on this. My wife and friends are all telling me that I am making a big mistake. Thanks, Brian



A: Yes, I am in agreement with your wife and friends. While the seller's broker will handle your offer, they cannot represent you in the process and look out for your needs in any way. They can communicate with you but they cannot guide you in the process. You really want a broker who is representing your interests and needs and is looking out for you in each phase of the process. The likelihood of you being able to negotiate half the commission away if there is only one broker in the transaction is not something that you can count on and in my opinion that is putting you at risk.

Q: We need a quick answer to this if you can. We have found a house to buy that we really like and meets all our needs. The one issue/concern we have is that the house has not been lived in for many years and it is in really bad shape. How do we ascertain what it will cost to fix, repair and upgrade the property? The seller's broker says that the family who owns the place is not wanting to do any work on it. Suggestions?

A: You can add a clause in your contract that states that you will ascertain the costs to do the work and or you can just include it in your home inspection that you will have done. If the sellers are not willing to accept that issue in an offer, that is telling you that they are not going to correct their price to do any of that work. You then have to decide if this property is really for you. Good luck.




