

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Field Notes of a Maine Birdwatcher: Something new under the Sun

An old adage suggests, "There is nothing new under the sun," but birdwatchers are always on the look-out for something new. My friend Joe and I were planning a visit to the tropics when we thought of Puerto Rico. This Čaribbean island is close to mainland USA, easy to reach from Miami, and a territory of the United States, so visiting is uncomplicated.



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

It looks as though Brianne's fifth career may be around awhile.

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

Watch the rare Eclipse of the Sun on April 8


Get ready for the spectacular celestial event of the year. On Monday, April 8, the moon will pass in a direct path between the earth and the sun, causing a total solar eclipse. This exceptional and stunning sight promises to be an awe-inspiring memorable moment.

The eclipse will pass over many sections of the country and be seen by millions of people. The 115-mile-wide path of the eclipse in the United States starts in lower Texas and passes through twelve states, ending in Maine.

The eclipse in Maine starts at about 3:30 PM and will last almost 4 minutes and 30 seconds. It will are available at many lobe one of the longest total solar eclipses in this century. During the eclipse daylight will be transformed into total darkness. Towns in Maine in the path of totality include Millinocket, Rangeley, Greenville, Jackman and Carrabassett Valley.

Warning! Do not look at the eclipse without protective eyeglasses. Regular sunglasses will not protect your eyes from damage by the direct rays of the sun. Protective glasses





Cream of Celery Soup

Ingredients:

- 1 Tablespoon Olive oil
- ¹/₂ cup sweet onion, diced
- ¹/₂ cup chopped fresh chives 8 - 10 Celery stalks, cleaned and roughly chopped
- 1 clove garlic, minced 4 cups Chicken or vegetable broth
- 1 teaspoon fresh Dill
- 1 teaspoon fresh Thyme 1 teaspoon fresh Parsley
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- ¹/₂ teaspoon cracked black pepper
- ¹/₂ cup heavy cream
- Creme Fraiche or sour cream optional

Directions:

In a large saucepan, heat the olive oil over medium-high heat until it shimmers. Add in the onion and chives sauteing until the onions are translucent. Add the celery and garlic and continue to saute for an additional 1 minute, do not allow garlic to brown.

Add in the chicken broth, dill, thyme and parsley. Season with salt and pepper. Allow the soup to simmer on medium-low for about 20-25 minutes until the celery is soft.

Carefully pour hot soup into a blender, cover and place a towel over the top and blend until the soup is a smooth puree.

Return the celery puree to the pot and stir in the heavy cream. Reheat, adjust seasoning and serve immediately with a dollop of Creme Fraiche or sour cream.

Spring Chicken Stew

- Ingredients:
- 3 4 Tablespoons olive oil
- 2 pounds, boneless, skinless chicken breast, cut into even chunks
- 1 large onion, diced
- 3 cloves garlic, sliced
- 2 carrots, diced
- 10 ounces, Baby Bella mushrooms, wash, trimmed and quartered
- 1 zucchini, diced
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- ¹/₂ teaspoon cracked black pepper
- ¹/₄ cup all-purpose flour
- 1 Tablespoon fresh chives, chopped
- 1 Tablespoon fresh parsley, chopped
- 2 Tablespoons lemon zest
- 4 cups chicken broth

Garnish optional, additional chopped fresh herbs, lemon zest and grated parmesan cheese

Directions:

In a heavy bottomed stock pot, heat the olive oil until shimmering and add the chicken sauteing until lightly browned on all sides and remove from pan.

In the same pan add the onions, garlic, carrots, mushrooms, zucchini and herbs, season with salt and pepper and saute until the onions are translucent - about 3 minutes. Add in the flour and cook for an additional 3 minutes until all the vegetables are coated with flour.

Slowly, add the chicken stock, deglazing the pan and add the chicken back in and continue to simmer over medium-low heat for about 20 minutes until the chicken is fully cooked and vegetables are fork tender. Adjust seasoning and serve over rice, egg noodles or pappardelle pasta. Garnish with fresh chopped herbs, a little lemon zest and grated parmesan cheese.

This savory brunch quiche was served to King Charles and Queen Camilla the day they ascended to the throne. Lucky for us, Buckingham Palace shared the recipe that serves 6, can be eaten hot or cold, and has "royal approval" for store-bought pastry, if preferred.

Ingredients for pastry:

1 cup flour Pinch of salt 1/4 cup cold diced butter 1/4 cup lard 2 tbsp. milk (or ready-made crust!)

Ingredients for filling:

1/2 cup milk 3/4 cup heavy cream 2 medium eggs 1 tbsp. chopped fresh tarragon Salt and pepper 1 cup grated cheddar cheese 1 cup cooked spinach, lightly chopped 3/4 cup soya beans

Directions:

Sieve flour and salt into a bowl; add fats and rub mixture together using finger tips until you get a sandy, breadcrumb-like texture.

Add milk a little at a time and bring ingredients together into a dough.

Cover and allow to rest in 'fridge for 30-45 minutes.

Lightly flour the work surface, then roll out pastry to a circle slightly larger than top of pie tin and approximately 1/4" thick.

Line the tin with the pastry (no holes or the mixture might leak). Cover and rest 30 minutes in 'fridge.

Preheat oven to 375.

Line pastry tin with parchment, add soya beans and bake 15 minutes before removing parchment and beans.

Lower oven to 325.

Mix milk, cream, eggs, herbs and seasoning.

Scatter 1/2 grated cheese in pastry tin, top with chopped spinach, beans and herbs, then pour in liquid mixture.

Gently stir mixture to be sure filling is evenly dispersed.

Sprinkle remaining cheese on top, place quiche in oven and bake 20-25 minutes until set and lightly golden.

Ham and Cheese Croissant Bake

Tastier than Jelly Beans: A family favorite for Easter

Coconut Macaroon Nests

Ingredients:

Vegetable-oil cooking spray 4 large egg whites 1/2 tsp. coarse salt 1 pkg. (14 oz.) sweetened flaked coconut

Directions:

Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Coat muffin tins with cooking spray. Mix egg whites and salt, then add coco nut. Drop 2 tbsp. of mixture into each tin. Lightly press mixture into bottom and up sides of each cup. Bake 28-30 minutes, or until light golden on top. Cool 10 minutes on rack before removing from tin.

Helpful Hints

Storing onions so the papery skins don't litter your pantry? Put onions in a small mesh zipper-top laundry bag. Skins stay contained and mesh allows air to circulate so onions don't get moldy.

Dull vs. shniny side of aluminum foil: which works best? According to the US Department of Agriculture, tin foil's twosided finish is the result of its production process. When the material passes through rollers, two layers of foil are pressed at the same time, reducing the risk of breakage. As a result, one side is shiny and the other is matte. But it doesn't matter which side you use because they react with food the same way. Leftover cheese?Use a food processor to combine 8 oz. leftover cheese (cut into 1" pieces) with 3 tbsp. non-oaky dry white wine, 1 garlic clove chopped, 1 tsp. fresh thyme leaves, 1/2 tsp. pepper. Process until creamy (approx. 1-2 minutes), season with salt/pepper, and serve!

3 oz. deli nam or prosciutto, torn into pieces 4 oz. creamy Brie, cubed 1/2 cup shredded Swiss or Fontina cheese 2 tbsp. Everything Bagel Spice (optional)

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a deep 9x13-inch Pyrex baking dish. Arrange torn croissants in dish and lay 2 tbsp. thinly sliced butter over them. Transfer to oven, bake 5-8 minutes, or until croissants are lightly toasted. Heat olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. When oil shimmers, add mushrooms and season with salt/pepper. Cook undisturbed for 5 minutes or until golden, then stir and continue cooking until mushrooms have caramelized (approx. 3-5 minutes). Add garlic and thyme, cook an additional minute. Remove from heat and set aside. In a large bowl, whisk milk, cream, eggs, mustard, cayenne and a pinch each of salt and pepper. Add toasted croissants, mushrooms, ham and Brie. Gently toss to combine, then pour mixture back into casserole dish. Top evenly with Swiss cheese and sprinkle with Everything Spice.
