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Healing and hope at the core of Rett's Roost in Ogunquit

Deana and Jim Cavan didn't know a lot about childhood cancer when they met in college in 2008. Married in 2011, the couple looked forward to starting a family. Their son Everett was born in 2014. Cancer entered their lives six months later when he was diagnosed with a malignant solid tumor in his liver. The aggressive cancer would take his life, despite access to excellent pediatric care in Boston.

"We never knew childhood cancer was so prominent – one in 260 before turning 20, and one in five will pass away from it," said Deana Cavan. "Treatments are limited and antiquated; our son's chemotherapy drugs were developed in the 1970s. When Everett died, we decided to shift careers. My husband found work in sports and business writing. I left my PhD program to start a nonprofit to help families like our own. We named it Rett's Roost: Rett - our son's nickname - and Roost because he always resembled a wise, allknowing owl to us with his large round eyes."

"It's not always easy will receive the diagnosis to take the latter path. I've spent ten years helping parents learn that they can choose to grow. Finding gratitude, when it feels like you've been dealt one of the unluckiest hands in life, requires people to dig deep into their psyche and recognize the duality in life; that there will be both great suffering and great joy. I believe that my experience studying yoga philosophy helped me focus on balancing pain with good."

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


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Maine News Briefs

Hospital for exotic companion mammals offers quality care to the often under-served pets

It all started with a rabbit. Her name was Hops and she was a black minilop. She belonged to Dr. Matt Ford and his wife, Amy, when they were in college. "Hops taught us about what amazing, intelligent and entertaining pets rabbits could be," said Amy, "and as Hops aged, we became increasingly aware of the difficulty in finding qualified veterinary care for her."

Since that time they have talked about opening a hospital that would be specifically dedicated to the unique needs of rabbits and other often-overlooked critters. In 2022 they sold their previous hospital in Scarborough (a large cat and dog hospital that also saw some exotic pets) and built their dream facility in the Shoppers Village plaza in Kennebunk.

The Southern Maine Hospital for Small Mammals (SMHSM) is Maine's first hospital exclusively serving rabbits, rodents, ferrets, chinchillas and hedgehogs. SMHSM is a full-service primary care hospital offering wellness and sick pet visits, a diverse array of surgical procedures, an in-house diagnostic laboratory, x-ray and ultrasound. "We're excited to be able to offer these underserved pets the same high quality of care that cats and dogs receive in everyday practice," said Dr. Matt.

The hospital opened in October 2023 and has already treated close to 400 patients. It can be reached at (207) 535-9330. SMHSM's official ribbon cutting will be held at 3 PM May 2 at the facility at 45 Portland Road, Unit 10 in Kennebunk. All are welcome.

Decades ago, Ellie Carberrry of Kennebunk donated a Yamaha upright piano to Kennebunk's First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church in memory of her parents. I was then in my 30s and thought, "What a generous gift. Maybe I can do that some day."

My love of ivory keys and piano music started when I was seven and taking lessons on an upright. My first piece was called "Cuckoo" and I can still play it today (for a chuckle). On my 10th birthday, my parents offered to buy me a used baby grand piano. Dad had recently returned from World War II and loved classical music, as did Mom. Dad asked, "Would you like that for your birthday?" They were so excited I thought I should say "yes," although I also feared I'd have to practice more. Indeed I did.

I began lessons with Harold Dart, a strict classical pianist who I found somewhat scary. We then lived in Bridgeport, Connecticut, an hour from New York City. Mr. Dart's reputation was enhanced by his accompanying famous Metropolitan Opera singers when they practiced. He even had a signed photo of Lawrence Melchior impressed!)

pecially when Dad paid me 25 cents for each half hour. Some days I even practiced an hour. I saved that money to buy Christmas presents for my parents, and continued lessons until I turned 18 and went to college. Mr. Dart thought I'd major in piano performance but I chose psychology instead.

When my husband and I moved to Kennebunk in the 1980s, I had just turned 40. I started lessons with David Maxwell in Portland, an exceptional organist, pianist and composer. After each lesson I eagerly practiced two hours a day. With three teenage sons living at home, there was lots of testosterone, so before dinner, I'd often play Beethoven's Adagio Pathetique which had hope you will come. a calming effect on our household.

Museum announces art preservation project

The Brick Store Museum preserves over 55,000 objects and archives relating to the history, art and cultures of Kennebunk and the surrounding communities. In March, the museum hosted a "March Madness" style competition, in which museum visitors voted for their favorite piece of art from the museum's list of conservation projects.


As even simple conservation projects can cost \$3,000 per painting, the museum is generally only able to conserve one piece per year. On April 1, the museum announced the winner of the "March Museum" Madness" vote: the painting of the Kennebunk ship NEVA, painted with watercolor on paper. The work is in severe need of conservation. It came to the museum in 1969 from the Estate of Edith Cleaves Barry, the museum's founder and great-granddaughter of the owner of the

The ship NEVA was the first vessel to be launched by William Lord of Kennebunk in 1832. The contract for building the ship was made by William Lord with George W. Bourne, partner of Henry Kingsbury, at the shipyard once located behind what is now known as the Wedding Cake House. The vessel was 80 feet long at the keel, 18 feet deep, and about 25 feet wide. The ship's painting shows it leaving the port at Le


Art conservation is a highly specialized process. This piece will travel to a paper conservation center for repairs and conservation to its paper backing, allowing it to be strong enough to exhibit for future generations.

Fair enough. But, in their defense, clichés are always on the mark, and immediately understandable. "Sometimes dreams come true" is a popular – and positive – example.



Savory Spring Vegetables

Sugar Snap Peas with Bacon and Shallots (serves 4-6)

Ingredients:

4 slices bacon

4 shallots, thinly sliced

1 1/2 lbs. sugar snap peas (strings removed)

1/4 cup water

1/2 cup fresh mint leaves, torn

1 tsp. grated lemon zest plus 2 tsp. juice

Salt and pepper

Directions:

Cook bacon until crisp; when cool, crumble coarsely.

Pour off all but 1 tbsp. bacon fat, heat to medium high (until shimmering); add shallots and cook until well browned (3-5 minutes).

Add snap peas, water, 11/4 tsp. salt and cook covered 2-4 minutes until peas are crisp-tender. Stir halfway through cooking.

Uncover and continue cooking, stirring frequently until liquid has evaporated and peas are tender (1-3 minutes).

Off heat, stir in mint, lemon zest and juice, and bacon. Season with salt and pepper.

Asparagus, Fennel and Fingerlings

(One Pan – Three Veggies – Serves 6-8)

Ingredients:

1 lb. fingerling potatoes, 1" in diameter, unpeeled, halved lengthwise

1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil (divided)

21/2 tsps. kosher salt (divided)

2 fennel bulbs halved and cut into 1/2''-thick wedges through core, plus 2 tbsps. chopped fronds (discard stalks)

1 lb. asparagus, trimmed, cut into 2" lengths

1 tbsp. grated lemon zest plus 1 tbsp. juice

Directions:

Toss together potatoes, 3 tbsp. oil and 1 tsp. salt in 12" cast-iron pot.

Put potatoes cut sides down in pan, single layer; cover and cook over medium-low until bottoms are golden brown and knife inserted meets no resistance, approx. 15-20 minutes. Transfer potatoes to plate; leave remaining oil in pan.

Put fennel wedges (cut side down) in pan, sprinkle with 1/2 tsp. salt, cook 3-4 minutes until well browned; then, flip fennel and cook another 3 minutes; transfer to plate with potatoes. Add remaining 1 tbsp. oil to pan, then asparagus; sprinkle with 1/2 tsp salt.

Cook over medium-high heat until asparagus is crisp, approx. 5 minutes. Off heat, stir in potatoes, fennel, lemon zest and juice, 1/2 tsp. salt.

Helpful Hints about Butter

Use a grater (the side with 1/4" holes) to cut cold butter cleanly and quickly for biscuits and pie dough. Stirring the mix is much easier.

Add extra flavor to roast chicken by thinly slicing butter, then coating the pats with poultry seasonings or fresh thyme and placing them under the skin of a whole chicken before putting in oven.

Herbed butter zings pasta and invigorates veggies. Bring 1/2 lb. unsalted butter to room temperature, put in small bowl and stir until "malleable." Add 1 tbsp. finely chopped parsley and chives, zest of 1 lemon and 2 tsp. kosher salt. Mix well, spoon herb butter into middle of a medium-size piece of Saran, wrap and mold into a small log, twist ends, chill until ready to use. Stays good for weeks!



Mocktails (aka: Making lemonade out of lemons)
